### Coal Oil Duty.

Farmers of this county use a good deal of parafine or coal oil. Under the new tariff there is something of a reduction of the duty, but amendments to still further reduce the duty were negatived. The matter was before the commons last Thursday. Mr. Richardson of Manitoba moved that oil be placed on the free list.

The motion was quickly declared defeated on a yea and nay vote.

Mr. Ellis moved a reduction from five cents to three.

Mr. Rogers (patron) seconded the motion. Mr. Talbot (ministerialist) supported the mendment.

Sir Charles Tupper thought he would have to come to the rescue of the government. He was of the opinion that a reduction would crush out an important industry and place Canada under the Standard oil monopoly and do no good to the consumer.

Mr. MacDonald of Huron (government) said he had made many campaign speeches for free oil, but had now made up his mind that the industry could not stand the reduction. He would vote with the government.

Mr. Davin wanted free oil. Mr. Taylor (opposition) was sorry any reduction was prooused on oil.

Mr. Flint regretted he could not support Mr. Ellis' motion, though he observed that it was in line with his own speeches and votes in opposition. He had since discovered that the old industry would be endanger-ed by the proposed reduction and he never intended to destroy it.


Mr. Davin offered to quote Hon. Mr. Davies on oil, when the minister raised a laugh by jocosely asking: "Did I ever speak on coal oil?
