An interesting history is connected with this weapon. It was presented to Gen. Paez by King William IV. of England, and was carried during a remarkable engagement with Spanish troops, the principal event of which is to be commemorated in a bronze statue, of heroic size, which is now being made, and is to occupy a prominent place in the plaza in the city of Caracas.

The story goes that general Paez, who was noted for his dauntless courage and boldness, was riding at the head of a few hundred Venezuelan troops, retreating from a Spanish army, various retreating from a Spanish army, variously estimated at from 7,000 to 10,000. He was splendidly mounted, and suddenly determined on a most desperate coup. Shouting to his men, he suddenly pulled his charger up short, lifted his forelegs from the ground and turned him as though on a pivot. Then he dashed back into the Spanish ranks, followed by his troopers. The action was so sudden and so unexpected that a panic seized the pursuers and they broke and fled in confusion. The story is one that the Venezuelans love to tell, and every schoolboy knows how the brave Paez with a handful of followers, routed 10,000 Spaniards.

In January last, in Caracas, President Crespa had the finest horse in his stables ridden at a hard gallop by a skillful rider in the broad space in front of his private residence, and reared up as the horse of Gen. Paez had been reared. At that moment a photographer, conveniently stationed, took a snap shot. This was repeated several times, until it was believed that a picture closely resembling the position of Gen. Paez's horse had been secured. The finished photograph was sent to a sculptor, who made a model for the bronze manufacturer. It is not believed that there is a statue in the world in which the horse and rider are in such a position as they will be shown in the statue to be erected in Caracas.

From Edmundston to Moncton.

An upper province paper has the following: In order to satisfy the east and to counter-balance the many millions the government purpose voting for the Crow's Nest Pass Road, among the roads to be subsidized during the coming season will be the short line across the Province of New Brunswick, from Edmundston to Barry's Mills, the last named being a few miles north of Moncton, on the Intercolonial. This road, which will be about 200 miles in length, will give a line, all in Canada, some forty miles shorter to Halifax than by the Canadian Pacific. The charter to build this road was obtained some years ago by the late John J. Macdonald, who built the Temiscouata Railway, and it is the company that now controls it and purposes building the new short line. It will be remembered that the Nova Scotian members of the House of Commons made a strong plea for the construction of the line in question some years ago, urging that Halifax would always occupy a disadvantageous position to that of St. John as the Dominion winter port, but the Canadian Pacific influence was too strong, hence the failure to get the measure through. It is stated that Hon. Mr. Blair is favourable to the scheme, although the city of St. John will probably oppose it. It is, however, understood that the Temiscouata Co. will get at least \$3200 per mile towards the construction of this line.

Copper from Green Water.

One of the most interesting sights in the great mining town of Butte is the process by which copper is caught from the emerald-colored water that flows from the Anaconda and St. Lawrence mines. It is estimated that this water, which for four or five years went to waste, is now bringing the Anaconda company \$30,000 a month, at a cost of \$1000 a month, says the Anaconda Recorder.

It is only within the present year that the company undertook to handle this water. Heretofore it was worked under a lease. An old German named Mueller was the first man to save copper from the water.

During the last three years Thomas Ledford had a lease on this water. He paid a 25 per cent. royalty to the company. It is claimed that realizes at least \$100,000 a year from the water. Ledford is a pretty rich man today. Now that the company is operating the water on its own account, it has discovered what a great money-making enterprise it is.

At the present time several acres of ground are covered with wooden vats. These are filled with all the old scrap iron they can hold. It has proved a splendid scheme for the disposing of the tons and tons of old iron the company has accumulated for years. Old hoisting cages, water pipes, wheelbarrows, railroad iron, in fact any old thing that consists of tin or iron is appropriated to this service.

It is said that for every pound of iron put into a vat, a pound of copper is produced. Where the water first attacks the iron, the copper absorbs the iron completely within three weeks. After the precipitation is effected the water is drawn off and the slimy copper is transferred to another tank, where the water is further drained off. These latter vats hold about fifteen ton of the copper, which now has the appearance of a clayish substance. This is sacked into packages of about 100 pounds. When in this shape it is sent to the smelters in this city. The product carries an average of 86 per cent. pure copper. The iron remaining in it makes a fine flux, and when mixed with other smelting ore, it is said to bring the ore up to a value of about \$300 a ton. The water from the mines is the most profitable product of the Anaconda Copper Mining Company.

Not so Bad as He's Painted.

Richard III.'s deformity is a great feature of Shakespeare, and is used with all Shakespeare's knowledge of human nature to explain much of what would be otherwise incredible. It is the bitterness of the deformed which makes Richard hate the world, which hardens his cruelty, and sharpens his already keen-edged ambition with the desire to overcome the scorn of man-kind for defects he could not help, by reaching a place where he could put the world under his feet. Yet there is little better evidence of his deformity than there is of his having been born with teeth.

It is hardly necessary to call witnesses to disprove such triviality as this, but it is easily done, and the refutation is complete. No contemporary other than Rous even alludes to Richard's deformity, and these others who are silent are the only writers of real authority. Fabyan, the Londoner, who must have seen Richard often, and who was a Lancastrian, says nothing of any deformity. The Croyland Chronicler, a member of Edward IV.'s council, is equally silent, and so, too, is Comines, although he twice speaks of Edward as the handsomest prince he had seen, thus showing that he noted physical appearance. Stowe said he had talked with old men who had seen Richard, and they declared "that he was of bodily shape comely enough, only a low stature." Even Rous himself in his portrait of Richard, indicates no deformity. The portraits, indeed—and there are several authentic examples—show us a man without any trace; either in expression of feature, or of bodily malformation. The face is a striking one, strong high-bred, intellectual, rather stern, perhaps, and a little hard in the lines, but not in the least cruel or malignant, and with a prevailing air of sadness.
