A WARNING.

Canada's day is at hand. This is readily admitted by all students of Canadian conditions. For many years we cast our eyes on the United States as to the country where prosperity had erected her throne. Late events have taught us that we were mistaken. Prosperity is a very coy mistress and she seldom confers her smiles indefinitely. It is no longer the fashion to point to the United States as the country where dollars grow on the public streets.

Canada may have played a slow game in the past, but the progress has been steady, and men who would scarcely believe that she was possessed of great potentialities, have learned to acknowledge their mistake.

We need to take warning, we have a great country and should be a great people, but we pay too much to the piper, if we do call the tune. Economy in government is the lesson we must learn, and in this our teacher is Great Britain, not the United States.

GREECE AND TURKEY.

Everyone who reads the papers is posted on foreign events nowadays. A few years ago, telegraphic communication to the press was confined to a few influential journals, but it is all changed now and when war is declared one hour in Athens, it is known the next hour in Woodstock. The telegraph has indeed made the world a small place.

Turkey has few sympathizers in this western world. Everyone is anxious for Greece to do the thrashing, though military authorities wag their sapient heads and express opinions which auger ill for the country of Homer and other notables.

Perhaps the seriousness of the situation to us lies in the fact that the great powers are likely to be inveigled into the warfare. If, as it is said, Germany favors Turkey, we may be sure that Greece will not be without allies, who may do something more substantial than to merely sympathize.

William Macdougall, Major-General Gascoigne, Hon. Mr. Flynn, Lieut.-Gen. Montgomery Moore, Premier Turner of British Columbia, Senator Miller, Hon. Mr. Murray, Hon. F. Peters, Senator F. Masson, Chancellor Boyd, Hon. A. R. Angers, Hon. Thomas Greenway, Dr. Bourinot, Sandford Fleming, Principal Grant, Col. Smythe (late 100 regiment), Dr. Craik, Montreal; Lieut.-Col. Dennison, Toronto; Lieut. Marchand, St. Johns, Que.; Hon. James Mitchell, Premier of New Brunswick; John S. Willison, Toronto Globe; Hugh Graham, Montreal Star; W. C. McDonald, Montreal; J. Lorne McDougall, Auditor-General; Mr. Justice Routhier, Quebec; Chief Justice Taylor, Winnipeg; Mayor Samuel Bingham, Ottawa; Mayor Wilson Smith, Montreal; Mayor R. J. Fleming, Toronto; Dr. William Kingsford, the distinguished historian.

It is stated that the premier has already had the offer of a knighthood, but has so far declined to accept it. A direct command from Her Majesty, however, next June, to kneel, and the simple tap on the shoulder with the magic words, "Rise, Sir Wilfrid," will be an effective way of overcoming any scruples he may have.

The general impression here is that Mr. Laurier, with other distinguished colonial statesmen, will be sworn in members of Her Majesty's Privy Council. Sir Charles Tupper and Sir Donald Smith will, in all probability, be elevated to the peerage. In such an event Sir Charles would necessarily retire from public life in Canada and the opposition would have to select a new leader.

This journal has nothing to say against any of the proposed earls and knights, but it will send a petition to Her Majesty asking her to give the Imp the G. B.

PREACHED IN THIS COUNTY.

Sad end of a Gunning Expedition.

A dispatch from Sackville of Thursday last says:—Word was received here this morning asking if anything had been heard of Rev. T. L. Williams and Richard Carter, of Point de Bute, who started yesterday afternoon in a boat from Aulac on a gunning expedition, but had not yet been heard of. A negative reply was given, but about an hour afterwards a boat drifted ashore at Wood Point containing one man, who was utterly exhausted and benumbed by cold and exposure. A few minutes after being taken ashore he breathed his last. He was identified by a school master at Wood Point as Rev. Mr. Williams. No tidings of Mr. Carter have yet been learned, but as yesterday was very squally on the water, the supposition is he has been washed overboard. Mr. Williams was stationed last year in Centreville, Carleton County, and leaves a wife but no children. Mr. Carter has lately figured often as a constable in Scott Act connections. He had just received appointment on the Moncton police force. He has a wife and two children.

A Hint For Woodstock.

Towns which have neglected their sidewalks, of which there are several in Maine, will get no consolation from the decision of the law court, just announced, in the case of Nancy E. Hitchins vs. the town of Sullivan. The plaintiff of the case stepped into a depression in the walk and was thrown down and her arm broken. She sued the town and got a verdict for \$300. The town appealed on the plea that the sidewalk was built by private persons and had never been repaired or responsibility for it assumed by the town, and also that the town had not the sufficient notice of the defect. Both these exceptions the court overrules, the first on account of the statute that when buildings or fences fronting on any public domain have existing for twenty years, they shall be deemed the true bounds thereof and the law that when a sidewalk has been built, no matter by whom, and the municipal authorities have notice that it has become defective or dangerous, the municipality will be liable as though the sidewalk has been built by its express authority. As to the plea of defective notice, the court seems to think that "a hole in the sidewalk," its situation defined within nineteen rods, might have been found by the town officers, if they had searched for it diligently.—Aroostook Pioneer.

Temiscouata Railway.

Recently, Judge Oumet, of Montreal, gave judgment in the long contested case of A. R. McDonald, ex-superintendent of the Intercolonial Railway, against Charles Riordon of St. Catharines, the estate of the late John Macdonald and Ed Boswell. The plaintiff claimed a large sum as due him in connection with the construction of the Temiscouata Railway and the court gave judgment for \$197,000 with interest for seven years at 6 per cent. It is more than probable that the defendants will carry the case to a higher court.
