Britain's Glory.

When Britain entered Egypt the great body of the Egyptian people were in a position of abject and cruel servitude. The courts were corrupt and the people were ground down by a whole horde of subordinate tyrants. The tax farmers collected arrears of taxation by flogging every delinquent on the assessment roll. Egypt was as bad as Armenia when Great Britain undertook to govern that country in the name of the Khedive.

The results of British rule are illustrated in a comparison of the returns for 1897 with the returns for 1881, a year before the British occupation.

Egypt's population has increased by nearly 3,000,000 or forty-three per cent.

The land tax is \$450,000 less than in 1881, but the area of land cultivated has increased thirteen per cent.

In spite of many unusual expenses and the construction of large public works, including 212 miles of new railway, the average taxation per head has decreased twenty per cent.

The expenditure on public construction has gone up thirty-seven per cent., and the number of men called on carree (compulsory labor) has decreased from 281,000 in 1881 to 11,000 in 1897.

"It's the devil for any one to tell me a secret, for it is sure to come out in print."—HAZLITT.

"The head and heels alike of Mr. Edward Manning reposed on sofa cushions. The body of the gentleman in question was deposited over the sofa itself. Mr. Manning was slowly puffing at a handsome meerschaum held between his teeth and picking out dismal cords on a mandolin." The above paragraph, taken from a story in one of the magazines, is a fair example of the way women think of us downtrodden men. They are bound to have a fellow lying around on silk cushions, smoking rich brown meerschaum pipes or expensive cigars. Now I want it understood that I'm no slouch but meerschaums come high and I smoke the gay and festive clay, as for lying out as this chap did and handling a pipe and a mandolin at once, a man would have to be a circus man to do it.

If a fellow could perform the contortion properly he could get big money with Cook & Whitby. When I read the rot I tried to see how a fellow would manage the attitude. I got stretched out on the sofa all right, got a pipe in my mouth, and then tried to read a book. The fire fell out of the pipe, got in my eye, went down my neck and after disfiguring me for life, it burned eleven or seven holes in a new fancy four dollar summer vest. The landlady rushed in, one of the boarders, a cheerful idiot, turned the nose on me and when I figured up the day's expense I found that that foolish female's foolish story had cost me seventeen dollars and thirty-nine cents not counting doctor's bills. Young man, let me warn you against taking any stock in women's stories about men. St. Elmo and Under Two Flags are all tommy rot. Read men's stories, Anthony Hope's, Kipling's, Robert Barr's, Stanley Weyman's, anything but women's stories of men.

"The various modes of worship in the Roman world were regarded by the people as equally true, by the philosophers as equally false, and by the magistrates as equally useful," writes Gibbon. Perhaps this saying might have an equally appropriate application to the modern world. Years ago men fought and died and for what they considered religious principle. Catholics and Protestants burned and were burned. The supporters of Prelacy and the supporters of Puritanism persecuted each other, and men became outlaws rather than surrender what they believed to be the truth. We scoff at the enthusiasm of these religious zealots, and yet they were, at least, moved by strong convictions. Now-a-days a man runs from one religious creed to another, just as his fancy dictates. Rarely does conviction figure in the interesting race. Like a humming bird he flies from one flower to another, gathering the sweets while they last, and leaving when the honey is turned to bitter. With the old Romans, we acknowledge all religions to be equally true, or equally false, and the whole thing as equally useful. A celebrated controversial writer said that no man was justified in changing his religion, excepting on the ground that by so doing he would serve God better. But he must have been an old-fashioned and out-of-date individual, not so wise as the Romans of whom Gibbon wrote, or, the Christians of this tolerant age.

It appears that Lieut. Carranza, an attache of the Spanish embassy at Washington, before the war and an officer of the Spanish navy, challenged Gen. Lee or Capt. Sigbee to fight a duel, in view of their imputations on Spanish honour. No notice was taken of the challenge, by either Gen. Lee or Capt. Sigbee, but a Mr. Dwight offered to fight if he had the choice of weapons. This Lieut. Carranza will not do, on the ground that the challenging party has the right to choose the weapons. It all seems very childish and very wicked. But, after all, what is the difference between an individual Spaniard wishing to kill an individual American, and a collection of Americans wishing to kill a collection of Spaniards. If duelling is a violation of the moral law, why is not war equally a violation of the same law. "Thou shalt not kill" is as applicable to one as to the other, whether the killing be done retail or wholesale. Does the simple fact that two nations decide to butcher each other, make the butchering either less brutal or more moral, because a declaration of war has been made. If I have a conscientious scruple against shooting my neighbor, is that scruple removed because somebody else tells me I must do so? When is my liberty if I must kill whether I wish to do so, or not? Duelling to the Spaniard is no more murder, than killing people in war, and in this it is the Spaniard who is consistent. The time will come when people will regard war in the

same light that they now regard duelling. What harm had those poor seamen in the Philippines done to America, that they should be sent to eternity by agonizing deaths. They did not blow up the Maine, whoever else did. They probably had no hatred to the United States. Why should they be made a vicarious sacrifice for others' sins? Logic has no reply, reason is silent. Here is another thing. Holy men on both sides pray that the enemy may be destroyed. Fancy, the Founder of Christianity praying for the slaughter of His enemies. If aid is wanted by warring nations, they had better look to the devil for it, for war is his delight and honour.
