GO Ahead Glasgow.

The Hamilton Herald observes that not seldom you hear even intelligent citizens speak dubiously of municipal control of the street railway system, electric lighting and similar natural monopolies as a "socialistic idea," and therefore dangerous to the well-being of society. It's amusing. Why we in Canada are away behind the age in the science of municipal government. The same can be said of our neighbors over across the border. In Germany and Great Britain they are far in advance of the people of this continent in all that appertains to civic affairs.

Take Glasgow, for instance. The Herald has frequently referred to Glasgow as a town that has blazed the way in municipal reform, but its achievements in this direction cannot be too frequently pointed to as evidence of what can easily be done when there is the will to do it. The following record of Glasgow's progress in reform, which is taken from an old country paper, should open the eyes of those of our citizens who catch their breath at the very mention of "municipal control."

Glasgow's corporation long ago acquired the gas and water undertaking, in 1864 they took over the tramways. They are about to establish a municipal bank! The city owns a labor bureau and the corporation have charge of ten churches, which they are bound to maintain. The municipality provides baths at two cents "a swim," and public wash-houses for the convenience of housewives who have not the facilities for purifying clothes at home. The city owns several model lodging houses, not to speak of a family home. On Saturday afternoons during the winter months there are corporation concerts the admission of which is one penny. The council have laid out a golf course, the rate for a day's play on which is two pence. In the summer months they have occasionally a dozen bands performing in the public parks on one day, they deal with cases of infectious diseases at their own hospitals; they have built, and are still building, houses where the working classes can live at moderate rents. Only quite recently the corporation opened a "People's Palace," in which musical entertainments are given free. Apart from other projects on hand, such as acquiring the telephone system, the cleansing of the odoriferous Clyde at a cost of over a million sterling, the establishment of free libraries, and the installation of an electric system of haulage for the tramways, the corporation seriously contemplated a measure the other day for the reform of the "corner boys," and have resolved to build for themselves, on the banks of Loch Katrine, a house for what one member called "a home for decayed councillors." Then a scheme for the municipalization of the public house is shortly to be discussed. No wonder, therefore, Glasgow is looked upon as a "go-ahead" city.—Ex.

The Church Favors War.

It seems to be the opinion of a considerable section of the Christian church that the Founder of Christianity was altogether wrong in His views about the wickedness of war and the propriety of loving our neighbors as ourselves. Many of the churches absolutely deny His right to the title of the Prince of Peace. They strongly favor war. Last Sunday, in the leading Presbyterian church in New York, Dr. David Gregg, preached a stirring war sermon, and had the American flag draped over the pulpit. He enunciated the principle that "This national crisis is an opportunity from God." The congregation at the conclusion of the war sermon gave three cheers for his declaration that "When a nation is true to God and His principles, making these a part of its policy and administration, it is always sure to win the day. This cannot be done by compromise or cowardly neutrality."

On the same Sunday, the Reverend D. Randolph, pastor Trinity Methodist church in Jersey City, preached a vigorous sermon in favor of the war with Spain. He said:

Some things are worse than war. It is worse than war to gain peace at the cost of righteousness. The man who would have peace at any price, puts a premium on injustice and despotism."

He strongly approved of the war, intimated that God was on the side of the Yankees, and led the congregation to believe that there could be no reasonable doubt that God Almighty, the one God of all the world, would give His Spanish children right merry hell.

These sermons have attracted much favorable attention, and are samples of the spirit which animates a large portion of the Christian church. It is therefore quite clear that

He who preached the sermon on the Mount was a much mistaken individual, that He was entirely in error when He taught the great principle that God is Love, and that we should love our neighbors, and in emphasizing His declaration that we should "resist not evil." He was certainly a social fanatic of a most dangerous character.—Bobcageon Independent.

DALTON MCCARTHY.

D'Alton McCarthy M.P., died on Wednesday evening last. He met with an accident, while driving, the previous Sunday, and in spite of the efforts of the best surgeons in Toronto, he passed away. He was, in many ways, a remarkable man. Born in Ireland, he came to Ontario when a youth, and after a good grammar school education entered the study of law. As a lawyer he was exceedingly successful. One of his partners was Mr. B. B. Osler, Q. C., the great criminal lawyer. Each partner was in his way, an ornament to the bar.

Mr. McCarthy entered politics as an out and out conservative. He was connected by marriage with Sir John Macdonald, and for the first few years of his parliamentary life, was a confidential adviser of Sir John, and was often termed "the brains of the party." At the time of the Jesuits Estates Bill he broke away. On that occasion he made a very famous speech in Parliament. The house was out of sympathy with him, and for two hours he spoke valiantly in favor of what he believed was right, amid the trying silence of those once his friends, and the hostile interjections of his political opponents. If Mr. McCarthy was anything he was fearless. He was guided by principle, that inveterate enemy of the ordinary politician. Mr. McCarthy became the leader of the Equal Rights party, which like most third parties has dwindled to nothing. He also favored the patrons. At the last general election, his breach with the Conservatives was widened beyond all chance of future welding together. Lately, he has devoted himself mainly to his profession.

In Toronto where Mr. McCarthy was best known he was highly respected. Like Goldwin Smith, he held the respect of those who differed from him. It is idle to speculate, but had Mr. McCarthy never broken from the Conservative ranks, he would undoubtedly have been their leader, after the death of Sir John Thompson, if not, after Sir John Macdonald's death.

In his sad and untimely decease, the independent element in Canadian political life, loses one of its brightest examples.

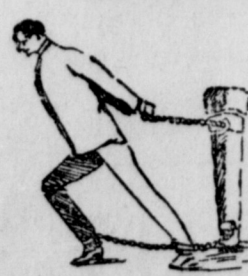
