




JANUARY 5, 1898 HE IS EIGHT FEET TALL. His weight is Only 156 lbs. but His Legs Cannot Support Even That. Bud Rogan, a negro, of Gallaton, Tenn., is eight feet tall. Bud has a reach with each arm extended of 96 inches, the greatest in the world, and 21 inches more than Fitzsimmons' His hands are each 131 inches in length, and his finger nails are about the size of a 25c. piece. He is almost a skeleton, yet he weighs 196 lbs. His feet are 18 inches in length, and as large around as an ordinary man's leg. No shoes have ever been found that he could put on, and in consequence he he has to keep them wrapped in a blanket in cold weather. Another strange thing connected with him is that he cannot walk, step, nor stand upon his feet, his nether limbs being two small and weak to support his own weight. This wonder is about thirty years of age. He was, up to a few years ago, able to go about unaided, and could do as much manual labor as any other man, but for the past ten years he has been unable to walk or stand, and his only means of locomotion has been a team of goats, which are well trained, and a familiar institution of the town. Bud makes a living for his aged mother by strangers, who make him donations. If they should fail to voluntarily give him a "skeet" as the negroes term a nickle, Bud will remind them of their dereliction. Rogan has what is known to the medical men as acromegally, a disease characterized by the enlargement of the bones, especially of the hands, feet and face. The skin is coarse and has a tendency to perspire, and is accompanied by a continual thirst. Gen-

erally one thus afflicted has no sense of taste smell or hearing,, but Rogan is possessed with all these. The disease was first discovered in 1886, by a physician of Paris, France, and only a few cases are known to the medical fraternity. No treatment has ever been found to be of any value. However, Rogan is in good health, and suffers no pain. He is an enormous eater, yet never gains flesh.


