LOOK BEFORE YOU LEAP.

Carleton County Boy's Warning to Intending Emigrants.

The following letter comes from a young man from Woodstock, who went West about a month ago. It is worth reading.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 15.

MR. EDITOR,—I feel it my duty to once more become your humble scribe out of friendship to Carleton County boys in general or any where in the east. I want to say to you unless you have lots of money you had better stay at home. If you are en route for the Klondike be sure you have got a good supply of currency before you start, for you will need more than you are aware before you get through. Klondike outfitters, hotels, lodging houses and restaurants are doing what is called a driving business. But if you are looking for employment, don't come to the coast to look for it, for there are clerks, book-keepers, tradesmen and common laborers enough here for two such places, and more are coming in on every train from all parts of the world. There are hundreds of men looking for employment, and for places to sleep. I say, don't come here looking for employment, for you will be sadly disappointed. This story about men throwing up good positions here and going North is all a fake. You don't hear a citizen here saying anything about it, only to pity the poor fools who are on their way up.

What manufacturing is done here, Chinese and Japs, as they call them, are employed, who work for the paltry sum of 85cts. per day, on which no white man can exist. Board at its cheapest is from five dollars to seven a week. And if you find a chance to work they have the nerve to offer you one dollar and twenty-five cents, and, in more places one dollar, for eleven and twelve hours' work.

Don't be led from home by this cut in rates, unless you want to travel to see the country, if so well and good. There will be hundreds of men working for their board here this summer, and in fact, they are doing that now. Of course this seems a beautiful climate. At present I have been here about three weeks and have not seen much rain but we are getting some beautiful weather just about like the last of April and first of May at Woodstock. As I was walking around yesterday I passed lawns as green as they will be in June in N. B. Flowers were budding and some were already in bloom. This is very pleasing to the eye, but with an empty purse and perhaps an empty stomach as well, things won't show up so bright. They say there are big wages here in the woods. Two dollars is the average pay in the woods, that is when you can get a chance or find an opening. Then you pay out of that five dollars per week for board and lose the time when it rains. If you have many rainy days in a month your pay is small. I only know of two young men who came here from the east this spring that have got anything of a place to work and these are not jobs you will ever make a fortune at.

Now Mr. Editor, I have tried to state this matter plainly and if you think it worthy of a place in your paper, you will, I think, do a favour to boys that are thinking of starting for the coast.

Recalling Good Work.

However the present rate cutting may result the Canadian Pacific can certainly claim that the fight has not been altogether without some compensating advantages. We all probably knew this in a vague sort of way, but its full significance has never actually dawned upon many Canadians until it was incidentally but very forcibly brought before them by the documents which recent events have produced. Now that it is comprehended this patriotic policy of the C. P. R. will tend to silence a great deal of the detraction and abuse to which it has been subjected, and largely widen the circle of those who, knowing what has been accomplished for Canada, actively appreciate the wisdom of the Company's methods and the marvellous success which has attended them.—(From the Cornwall Standard, Mar. 4.)

They work at a trade until they see about one half of its mysteries and then strike for higher wages. Act as if your own interest and the interest of your employer were the same. Good mechanics are the props of society. They are those who stick to their trades until they learn them. People always speak well of a boy who minds his own business, who is willing to work and who seems disposed to be somebody in time. Learn the whole of your trade.

When Putting Away Furs.

Shake and brush the furs thoroughly, hanging them in the open air—in the sun if possible. Wrap them closely in stout wrapping paper, being careful that no rent exists to give entrance to the wandering moths; tie the parcel firmly, then enclose it in an outside wrapper of paper, pasting up the ends, and one need have no fear of moths.
