ARMED TO THE TEETH.

Klondikers Who Wear Guns and Eat Bologna—Ready in Earnest.

There is now trailing across Montana from east to west some of the most motley crowds of men that ever crossed a continent. It is the crusade to Klondike that is now on in earnest, says the Helena Independent. In a few months the movement will be reversed, and thousands of the crusaders who now have money will be working their way back home again without any, but rich in experience.

Every west-bound Northern Pacific express that passes through Helena is loaded down with Klondikers. One day recently there were 14 coaches on No. 1, the west-bound train, which pulled in about on time. Nine coaches make an ordinary and a heavy train, but the rush was so great that five additional coaches had been attached to the train. Every day there were from three to six additional coaches to each westward-bound train.

Most of those bound for the Klondike are young men, but there are a few gray-headed enthusiasts among them. Many of them are from the East, and there are delegations from Iowa, Illinois and other middle states. A railroad man who came into Helena recently on the Pacific express said that 90 per cent. of the Klondikers travelled armed, and many of them exhibited their weapons in true Buffalo Bill style. They seemed to think that as they were in the wild West it would be advisable to have their trusty six-shooters at hand ready on the instant to repel an attack of train robbers.

"In one car alone," said the railroad man, "there were about 30 men who wore big colt revolvers in scabbards attached to harness under their arms. Nearly all of them also had big hunting knives stuck in their belts. The weapons were all bright and shiny, and made an imposing array. If the train had been going the other way, one would easily have imagined a filibustering expedition on the way to liberate Cuba. I thing from the way some of them talked they rather looked for the train to be held up, and were almost wishing for the adventure. These men exhibited their weapons in the way that might be expected of Wild Bill, the king of the plains. They would get off when the train stopped and walk up and down the platform with their big guns and knives in plain view. They were on parade, and it did them good to walk through large crowds at the more important stations. These fellows and their arsenals were never parted. They actually slept with their pistols and their knives strapped to them.

"Now, I suppose that the armament of those men must have cost each of them in the neighborhood of \$30. Some of them had rifles as well as revolvers, and I saw one man with a shotgun. Although they had expended so much for guns, they did not waste any money on their dining car. Nearly every Klondiker on the train either brought his provisions with him or ate at stations along the line. And they had no money to spend for sleeping car berths, either. Perhaps they were only inuring themselves to the hardships they propose to subject themselves to on the way to the gold fields."

A great deal of talk is being made about the jealousy or bad feeling existing between the town of Woodstock and the County of Carleton, and I am frequently told that instead of diminishing, with time, this unhappy sentiment is growing. In fact a certain reliable party told me, the other day, that if the court house and gaol happened to be burned, by a visitation of Providence, or by the torch of the incendiary, the county council would vote for new buildings to be erected in Newburg, rather than Woodstock. I cannot but think this is an exaggeration. It is difficult to analyse properly the causes leading to this unpleasant feeling. At any rate, it is absurd. The fact is that the country being a municipality, and the town an incorporation, a sort of imperium in imperio exists, and there is always likely to be difference between the imperiums. The town has undoubtedly made some bad breaks, and thus incurred the ire of the country. It is a good deal easier to start a bad feeling than to suppress it, when once started. There is one way in which the town can get even with the county. Let our monied men, and we have lots of them, though they do put on awfully poor mouths, invest their capital in new industries. This will bring population, and in time we will build up the town till it embraces Upper Woodstock, and thus the court house and gaol question will be settled for all time.

Chatham is to have a public library. Hartland already has an excellent reading room. St. Stephen and St. Andrews both have public libraries, although the latter, it is true, was started under private auspices. Yet it fills all the purposes of a public library, and is most thoroughly conducted. We have the means to start a good library, but do not seem to have the disposition. Surely this is a pity. A reference library, even, would be a capital thing.

"He jests at scars who never felt a wound." Sherman, one of the heroes of the civil war said, "war is hell." Wellington became sad whenever a remark recalled Waterloo. But politicians who have little expectation of facing the guns, and editors who would make money by printing the startling war news, talk of war as glorious, and the unthinking and feverish mob throws up its hat and cheers the warlike frenzy which it mistakes for patriotism.

I see that Mr. Sheagreen has been elected president of the A. O. H. for the province. We now have the Grand Master of the Orangemen, and the president of the Hibernians, citizens of our town. They are both agreeable gentlemen, and not at all sanguinary in appearance. The Orange and the Green are well represented in Woodstock.

Near the close of the month the circuit court will be meeting, under Chief Justice Tuck. It promises to be an unusually interesting session. The Canovan case is a mystery, and the jurors who will be called upon to decide the fate of the prisoners, should be the best picked men in the county. For the first time in many years, the issues of life and death will be in their hands.

No Plebeian Allment.

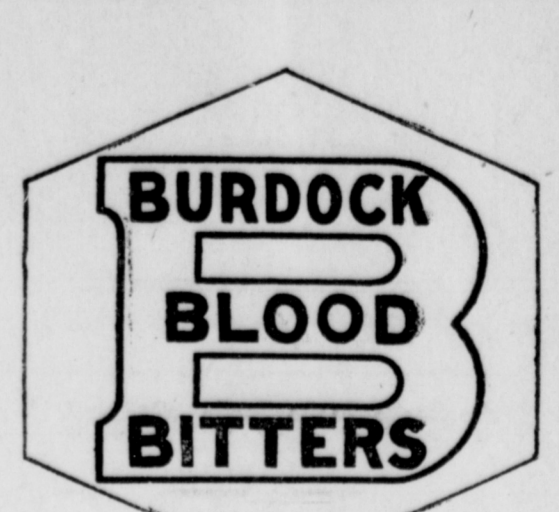
The Czar of all the Russias frowned heavily as the messenger informed him that the people, having heard of his illness, clamored for a bulletin.
