
Cloverdale—Four Days from Carlisle.

To the Editor of The Dispatch:
Sir,—Your correspondent was stopping at
Cloverdale a short time ago, and was sur-
prised at the way the mail route is arranged;
and came away feeling that a great wrong
was being done to the settlement of Clover-
dale. Cloverdale is sixteen miles from Hart-
land village and about four miles south of
Carlisle P. O. The mail is brought to Car-
lisle and there the Cloverdale mail is sorted
out and taken down every Saturday. The
Cloverdale and the Carlisle mail is taken back
to Carlisle where it lays four days, when it is
sent on to Hartland. Now, Mr. editor the
point is right here; a man in Cloverdale writ-
ing a letter Saturday morning to Montreal
can send it only 4 miles in four days while
a person writing a letter the same morning at
Carlisle would have his letter delivered at
Montreal and the answer promptly on the
road back to him before the Cloverdale
letter left Carlisle. Now is this justice to
the Cloverdale people? Another side of the
question is this the Cloverdale office is the
most southern post office on that road and
would if given a good chance become a pros-
perous office but this drawback causes the
people to drive up to Carlisle P. O. and to
carry their letters even to Woodstock and
other places so as to get them on the road
sooner, and as the post master's salary is
gauged by the amount of the postage stamps
sold by him you can see that his salary must
be small.

advantage of the Cloverdale office at an early
date I will close thanking you for the space

There are certain restless people who never seem satisfied to have an abiding place for any considerable length of time. Of such must have been the party referred to in the extract which I quote:—"An odd tombstone has been placed in a cemetery in Lincoln, Neb. It marks the grave of James Jacobs, a butcher, who died in 1881. The deceased was of a roving disposition, so his father had a valise modelled in marble and laced on the grave. The inscription, in addition to the name, day of birth and death, is 'Here is Where He Stopped Last.'"

Coun. Lindsay's motion at the council board some weeks ago, to do away with the dog tax, met with no support. The sentiment in favor of the tax, is not that there is a hostility in general to dogs, but that curs are not approved. When there are lots of curs, there is always danger from hydrophobia. I have just read of a case in Cayuga, Ont. A horse belonging to a resident of that town "was bitten by a dog evidently suffering from rabies. The horse appeared unwell. A doctor was called in, and pronounced it hydrophobia. The animal was put in an isolated stable, and by next morning the disease had developed beyond all doubt. The doctor ordered the horse to be shot. Another dog was also bitten by the rabid dog. He apparently was not suffering, but was ordered to be destroyed by the Board of Health. A small boy was also bitten. Every precaution is being taken to prevent a further spread of the disease." It does not follow that a dog that pays his tax will not have hydrophobia, but a dog that is cared for is less likely to indulge in promiscuous biting of harmless citizens.

I often wonder at religious bodies using enormously large hymn books in their services. The Catholics and Episcopalians suit my taste with a small book that a fellow can tuck in a pocket without ruining the set of his Sunday coat. The adherents of one religious body in this town are actually becoming round shouldered with lugging a ten pound hymn book to church. If a young man were to be so piously minded as to carry one of these volumes into battle with him, it would not only save him from a bullet, it would stop a cannon ball. However as these books are made for use in worship and not for breast plates, this would hardly count as much of an argument for them. I know of thousands of young men in Woodstock who have been deterred from joining a certain church simply because they did not feel strong enough to carry the hymn book, and were too poor to buy wheel barrows. I understand that some of the big-hymn-book churches, ask of an applicant for membership, that beside knowing his catechism he shall be able to carry ten pounds half a mile without turning a hair. Give me a church with as much grace and as small books as possible.

The First Watch.

At first the watch was about the size of a dessert plate. It had weights, and was used as a "pocket clock." The earliest known use of the modern name occurs in the record of 1552, which mentions that Edward VI. had "one larum, or watch of iron, the case being likewise of iron gilt, with two plummetts of l.c.l."

The first watch may readily be supposed to have been of rude execution. The first great improvement—the substitution of springs for weights—was in 1560. The earliest springs were not coiled, but only straight pieces of steel. Early watches had only one hand, and, being wound up twice a day, they could not be expected to keep the time nearer than within fifteen or twenty minutes in twelve hours. The dials were of silver and brass. The cases had no crystals, but were opened at the back and front, and were four or five inches in diameter. A plain watch cost 150s., and after one was ordered it took a year to make it.
