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FAMILY QUARRELS.

Under the heading, Harmony with England, the Boston Herald of a recent date has a long editorial. It says that "the suggestion that the United States act in unison with Great Britain in the affairs of the world appeals pleasingly to the imagination in some points of view. The kinship of the peoples of the two nations, in descent as well as in language, invites to this. Yet a family quarrel has prevented it for more than a hundred years. Family quarrels are often the most bitter of all quarrels."

Proceeding the Herald goes into the business of raking up old scores. It argues that England was sore toward America, because of the former's humiliation at the time of the revolution. Then, it skips the 1812 incident, and proceeds to haul England over the coals for her course in the civil war. England, the Herald, alleges, gave the north every reason to think she favored its policy, and when the struggle came sided with the south. The Venezuelan incident is brought up, and the Herald while admitting that England "would probably have governed the country which she might have acquired there better than any other European power," adds "but there was no European power that we would have less desired to possess it."

Other counts against England are that she assumed "a certain arrogant assertion of superiority socially and intellectually which was a constant cause of national irritation."

Concluding, the Herald says: "For ourselves, we doubt the utility of alliance with any foreign nation on the part of the United States to settle European or Asiatic questions, and we do not contemplate any cordial response to Great Britain to come to her aid in such an appeal on her part."

It is rather surprising to find the Herald, which generally takes a pro-English view speaking as it does in this editorial. Raking up old scores is disagreeable work.

Very deftly the Herald skips over the 1812 war, which certainly was no fault of Great Britain.

Did not the United States, on that occasion try to humiliate their mother, just when she was engaged in a war to the death with the giant, Napoleon?

When England stood alone for the liberty of the world where was the United States?

With regard to the great revolution, there are many students today who believe that by peaceful methods, separation from Great Britain could have been attained, and then we would have none of this feeling that the Herald half deplures, and two thirds approves.

How about the attitude of the U. S. to Canada now?

Could any large country have ever behaved more despicably, more contemptibly, to a smaller?

Have not all the resources of a malignant senate been used in endeavoring to kill Canada's trade and independence.

The Herald is wise enough to see this, and is constantly urging better trade relations with Canada.

But Canada is not disposed to make the approaches, she would at one time have made.

Her "Harmony with England" is unbroken and complete and the harmony is leading to increased trade.

As for the Venezuelan affair, there would have been no threats of war, if the U. S. had not thought they could easily desolate Canada.

They thought so in 1812, yet Canada is here yet.

and ability and moral, scientific or mechanical achievements and on the other hand not everybody is lucky enough or has pluck and courage enough to travel from country to country even with limited means, and study the habits and customs of his fellow men in their respective countries and, on the third hand nothing has a greater charm for a mortal being than to know about how people in other countries live and how they spend their earthly existence in the every day and common walks of life.
