If it stays over 24 hours has not the reasonable time expired?"

Old superstitions die hard. Lately there have been found those who make great sport of the "unlucky thirteen" superstition. I read in a reliable paper the following item: "Viscount Avonmore's Klondike party, which purchased 75 cases of champagne as part of the outfit, has been broken up by an extraordinary series of accidents. The party, which consisted of thirteen members, all told, proceeded as far as Edmonton, where Captain Alleyne died of pneumonia, contracted by going out in zero weather without an overcoat. Mr. Bannerman, another of the party, was arrested on a charge of assault, for attempting to stab a man in his employ. The Captain was bound over to keep the peace, and given four days to leave the country." Whether it was because there were thirteen in the party, or because they had champagne among their cargo, I leave for decision to somebody else.
