More of The Philippine Islands.

Events of the past few weeks have directed the attention of this country to a group of islands heretofore but little known to us (the general public), comparatively speaking. The Philippine Islands lie directly south of the island of Formosa, the recently acquired possession of Japan, mainly between the 5th and 22nd parallels of north latitude and the 117th and 127th meridians of east longitude. The group comprises, in all, about two thousand islands. The island of Luzon, on which the city of Manila is situated, is larger than New York and Massachusetts, and has a population of 5,000,000; the island of Mindanao is nearly, if not quite, as large. There are many other large and very populous islands. An idea of the extent of the Philippines may be formed, when it is stated that the six New England States, New York, New Jersey, Maryland and Delaware combined have not so large an area. Local and European authorities estimate the area of the islands at 150,000 square miles, and their population at 8,000,000 to 10,000,000.

From a recent report by the United States Consul Oscar F. Williams it is learned that there are about 25,000 Europeans reside on the island, some 12,000 of whom are established in the capital, Manila. English, Spanish and German houses are engaged in trade, advancing money to the natives on their crops. The land is fertile and productive, and lacks only intelligent cultivation. Abaca (manila hemp) is one of the chief sources of wealth of the country. Sugar cane does not give as satisfactory returns owing largely to the ignorance is planters. The average production of 175,000 tons or about one-fourth that of Cuba. The sugar has gone almost entirely to Japan, England, and the United States. It is of poor quality and very cheap. The cultivation of tobacco is one of the most important industries. The native coffee, although not equal to the mocha or bourbon varieties, has a fine aroma; it goes chiefly to Spain. Cocoa trees grow in abundance, and the oil is used for lighting houses and streets. The indigo is famous for its superior qualities.

Of the total exports of hemp from the Philippines for the ten years ended 1897, amounting to 6,528,965 bales (914,055 tons), 41 per cent went to the United States. During the same years the islands exported to the United States and to Europe 1,582,904 tons of sugar, of which more than 55 per cent went to the United States. The exports of those two products alone to the United States, during the ten years under review, amounted to \$86,263,722.80, or an average of nearly \$8,925,372 per year. The export duties and charges on the hemp and sugar exported to the United States, during the ten years ended with 1897, amounted to \$5,172,995.87.

It is estimated that in cigars, tobacco, copra, woods, hides, shells, indigo, coffee, etc., the United States has imported from these islands an average of about \$1,000,000 per month. Consul Williams thus shows that the trend of trade has been toward this country.

There is but one railway in the islands—from Manila to Dagupin—a distance of 123 miles. It is a single track and well built, the bridges being of stone or iron, and the station buildings—substantial. English locomotives are used which make 45 miles per hour. The government assisted in the construction of the road by making valuable concessions of land with right of way its entire length, and by guaranteeing 8 per cent per year upon the stock of the road for a period of 99 years, when it is to become state property. So far the road has paid more than 10 per cent per annum to shareholders. The Company Transatlantica (Manila-Liverpool) maintains a monthly service to Europe. There are four lines of steamers to Hongkong, and many local lines plying between Manila and the provinces, the largest having 28 steamers of 25,000 tonnage.—Railway Review.
