**Treasure From Klondike.**

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 15.—Louis Coste, Dominion Engineer of Public Works, returned on the steamer Quadra, having been obliged to postpone his trip up the Stikine River on account of the ice and slush in the stream. He expects navigation will be opened by May 5 at the latest. News brought by the steamer Pakshan from Dyea yesterday was that the first reports of the Chilcot avalanche were exaggerated by nearly 200 per cent. Instead of 150 people losing their lives the number is now supposed to be 52. The Pakshan left Dyea on Thursday, April 7, and the corrected list of dead up to that time has been issued, save with respect to 12 men who were missing. Assurances are brought down by the Pakshad that people need not give themselves much anxiety concerning their friends who were on the way from Dyea going to the summit. The party who met with misfortune was entirely composed of people returning from the Scales and those encamped near the fatal spot. The ill-fated party it now appears reached the summit at a critical moment. Had the people been a very few moments earlier or later they would not have been caught in the slide. The first treasure ship is expected to leave Dawson City about the middle of June with \$15,000,000 on board in dust and nuggets.

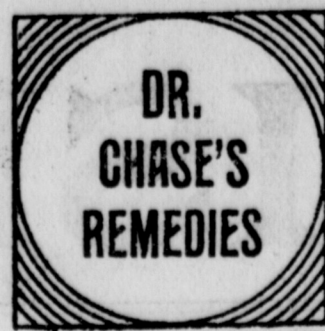
**Bill Killed.**

In Parliament last week the principle business was the defeat of the Kettle Valley Railway bill. Says the Toronto World:—Newspaper readers are tolerably familiar by this time as to the objects of this measure. The struggle over the bill finally resolved itself into a square fight between the two great railway corporations, the C. P. R. and the Grand Trunk, with the result that the great transcontinental line, is for the present at any rate, on top. Many of those who voted against the Kettle River Bill have done so avowedly for the reason that they want to see the C. P. R. reach the Boundary Creek country first; and some of those who voted against the bill tonight may next year be found voting for the measure. The lobbying for and against the bill has been most persistent—not to say glaring. The emissaries of the two companies, much to the disgust of some members of the House, even entered the chamber itself when the House was not in session to try their persuasive powers. The Kettle River Valley Railway project may, therefore, be regarded as defunct for this year at least.

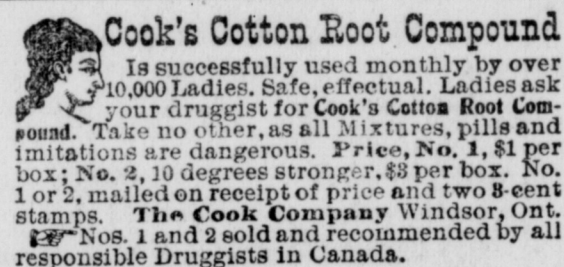
