A TEST OF SEA POWER.

The First Struggle Will be to Secure Command of the Ocean.

An officer of rank, speaking to the New York Sun, of the probable course the war will take, says:

"All of the regular army, no doubt, much of the National Guard, and perhaps a number of volunteers may eventually be called upon to do duty along the seacoast. Our coast line including the Atlantic, the Pacific, and the Gulf, is so extended that many thousand men will be needed to establish even a fringe of protection by land forces. But, on the other hand, very few of these troops will ever catch sight of a fighting Spaniard. The enemy would scarcely dare to land men at any point, and the only active service of our land forces would be in connection with the captured Cuba.

"It has been suggested that while a landing in force and a formal occupation of American territory would be out of the question, considering Spain's meagre resources, yet a swift Spanish cruiser might run into some feebly-protected point and land troops for a few hours of destructive villainy. Such troops, it is said, might effect heavy losses by the prompt use of fire and explosives, or they might exact a large ransom before retreating from the coast. These conjectures are far from comforting to the residents of the smaller coast towns or to the isolated dwellers beside the sea. It's conceivable of course, that they could do but little damage, and could simply indulge their natural love for guerilla warfare. I think, however, that such raids are mere imagination.

"Although our preparations for coast defence are of course not ideally complete by any means, they are, nevertheless, far more complete than the public, for obvious reasons, has yet been told. Every town of importance is now protected by batteries on shore, by mines and torpedoes off shore. And our navy, if small, is rapidly growing. The number of effective fighting ships cannot be increased as rapidly as one could desire. But the man that worries because we haven't a battleship for every 20 miles of coast ought to remember that we shall have far more fighting ships than the enemy can send to attack us, and that if the enemy's ships are kept out of mischief wherever they chance to be, all the rest of the coast is as safe as if the war were being fought on Mars.

"What is necessary in order to prevent a Spanish war vessel from finding herself alone, like a deserted stage girl in a black gown, is an abundance of small boats of high speed, boats that can maintain a perfect line of reconnaissance, and still be able to get out of the way promptly should the enemy attempt to rid himself of impertinent observers.

"Because if there were plenty of these fast small boats on our side, no Spanish vessel could get very near our coasts without the news coming quickly to one of our war vessels, which would then be on hand to prevent the Spaniards attempting to land troops or to shell the shore.

"That's no doubt the reason why the Government has bought so many fast tugs and yachts within the last few weeks. These so-called despatch boats and transports will serve as naval pickets and will be indispensable to the efficient maintenance of a naval trocha.

"The first shock of war will take place, without doubt, upon the sea. No troops would probably be moved from this country until the supremacy of the sea was definitely decided as between ourselves and Spain. Because if Spain could defeat our navy she might establish a blockade of Cuba and she might oblige any troops we had already sent there to share the horrors of a reconcentrado situation infinitely worse than that which shocked the world. But should the Spanish fleet be forced from the Western hemisphere, Spain might then abandon Cuba and sue for peace without our landing one soldier upon the Queen of the Antilles. Indeed, it would be foolhardy for Spain to attempt then to retain her grasp of Cuba.

"Yet should the Spaniards refuse to leave the island after their fleet had been driven away we would either invade in force or establish an open port for the insurgents. An invasion in force might prove a serious undertaking for American white troops, chiefly because of the unwholesome climate.

insurgents, the undertaking would require merely such a garrison as would keep the Spaniards from recapturing the town. The insurgents undoubtedly would soon open a line of communications from their principal field of operations to that port. Then if the insurgents could secure, along this line, un limited supplies, ammunition and arms, including the latest field artillery, and, if alone the same line could be sent in some hundreds of American officers, why, I imagine that the insurgents would shortly control the island without the American troops being obliged to attempt a regular invasion.

"The occupancy of a port in that fashion would require a large body of land troops. And, as all ports in Cuba, except yellow fever, I suppose our troops in any other port would not suffer as much as one might imagine from disease. For, of course, no sooner would we take the port than we would set to work all the methods of recent sanitary science.

"Why, I think even Havana, old and rotten as it is, both physically, morally, and politically, could be turned into a reasonably wholesome community by thoroughly draining the city and driving out the Weyler Spaniards."
