New York Sun: A correspondent of the Pittsburg Dispatch, signing himself "Ex-Attache," discusses the question of the probable temper and attitude of our population of foreign birth in the event of war between their adopted country and the land of their nativity. He assumes that in war with Spain the sympathies of Spanish-Americans, including citizens of this country whose nativity or lineage is Spanish, would turn naturally to their mother country, their racial prejudices being particularly strong, as is now indicated by the feeling in South America concerning the Cuban question.

Every one of the South American republics owes its independence of Spain to "the material assistance and moral support of the United States," and in none is there any desire to get back to the thralldom of Spain, yet now, when Cuba is "in the same position as that in which they found themselves in the first decades of the present century," he avers that, so far from sympathizing with Cuba, "the dominant classes from the Rio Grande down to Patagonia are almost to a man strongly in favor of Spain." He explains this by saying that "all the most influential families, those who have the wealth and power in their hands, are of Spanish descent, jealously proud thereof, and only too glad when in the Old World to claim relationship with their kinsfolk in Spain." "They are still Spanish in the core, even though some of them can look back to generations of ancestors born on American soil, several of the big cities of South America having gone so far as to get up popular subscriptions for the sake of helping the mother country to buy warships to fight the United States."

Whether this is or is not a correct description of Spanish-American feeling is a matter of slight consequence so far as concerns the United States. The part of the population which because of racial prejudices would sympathize with Spain in a war with us is very small, and it is more than offset by the hot sentiment in our favor which would prevail among the many Cubans who have found a refuge in the great American republic.

This correspondent, however, touches a matter of more gravity when he considers the attitude likely to be assumed by German-Americans in the remote and improbable event that in a war with Spain we should provoke the actual hostility of Germany. He computes that there are no less than 3,000,000 Germans of European birth settled here, "while there are at least twice or three times that number whose parents or grandparents were citizens of one or another of the States of the German Empire." While he does not think that in defence of their adopted country against any Spanish, English, or non-Teuton foe the patriotism of these could be doubted, he is skeptical as to the course they would pursue "if summoned by the United States to bear arms against Germany itself."

It Grows.

There is a piece of land adjoining a big city, and this place of land is divided into ten building lots. Ten men each buy a lot, nine of them building houses, and stores, and hotels, and occupy them, but one man leaves his lot empty, and does nothing with it. Being surrounded with houses and building, and the centre of considerable trade, that empty lot becomes very valuable. The original price was \$10, but it increases in value to \$100, and it is clear that the owner of the lot has not done anything towards making it more valuable. Then to whom ought the \$90, to belong;—to the nine men who have created the value, or to the one man who has done nothing? Who has earned the \$90; Have the nine men earned it, whose labour and enterprise have caused the increased value, or has the one man earned it who has never done an hour's labor, never raised his hand to make improvements, and who has actually retarded progress and blocked the current of commerce?

The foregoing is a very important question, and on the answer to it hinges the social development of the future. It involves the fundamental principle of the single tax theory, namely, that the increased value given to land by the people, should belong to the people and not to individuals. That theory is rapidly being adopted, and the effects of its discussion are manifesting themselves in quite unexpected directions. The Canadian Government granted to the C. P. R. a vast number of blocks of land in alternate sections along its line. These alternate sections are the property of the C. P. R. and the municipalities contend that they are subject to municipal taxation. Upon that subject

our esteemed contemporary the "Globe" has one of its usual clever articles, and it is very gratifying to this journal, and must be equally gratifying to every Advanced Thinker, to find that so important a periodical as the "Globe" recognizes, almost unconsciously to itself, the force of the single tax arguments. Speaking of the C. P. R. possession of alternate blocks of land it says:—

"It is clear that the farmers through all this checker board section are making money for the holders of this vacant land. The product of their industry is being absorbed by the railway corporation. The farmers build roads and bridges, which the company will virtually sell to the settlers of the future, for the increased value given to the land by these improvements is merely the value of the labor bestowed and the money expended on them. And while the farmers bear the expenses of all these public works, the company whose vacant land is thereby enhanced in value contribute nothing. Even the work of the farmers on their own land, the reduction of the prairie sod to cultivation, the building of homes and the improvement of farms, as well as the establishment of connections with rural merchants and local trade in necessary supplies, all tend to make the country more attractive to settlers and to increase the value of the land held idle. In short, the farmers are sowing what the railway company will reap."

The contention of the "Globe" that the alternate sections of land held by the C. P. R. should be subject to municipal taxation is unquestionably sound. When that principle is admitted, it is a great advance towards the still more important principle that every possessor of land should pay rent for that land to the people to whom it belongs. When that principle is generally accepted, and adopted, then all other taxation can be abolished. The single tax on land values, apart from improvements, will supersede all other methods of taxation, and an immense stride be made in the progress towards a higher civilization.—Bob. Ind.

A Curious Will.

The following rather curious will was made by Henry Christian Halm, of Waterloo in the year 1828. The latter part of it is very suggestive of the time in which Halm lived. The will reads:

"I commit my body to the earth to be buried in a decent manner, namely, that my body shall be put into the coffin with the same clothes or garments on in which I depart this life, for it is my desire to be interred as a soldier who dies in the field in defense of his country; not to be washed, shaved or handled about like a dead hog, which I deem to be indecent and unbecoming among people of my turn, free of pride, pomp and vanity; also that my coffin be made of rough boards, strongly nailed together, for I consider that ornamental and embellished coffins are of no use, but only a show of vanity and pride, and the expenses put in them would be a relief to the poor and needy. Also not to bury me until three days after my decease or until the blood has parted from the veins, and the dead smell coming on very perceptibly; also to be buried in any place most convenient, without any tombstone. Also on the day of my burial my friends and old acquaintances shall be invited, and none else; also, they shall have as much good liquor as they shall use, and endeavour to have a day of mirth and jollity to themselves, as I will not be able to partake with them."
