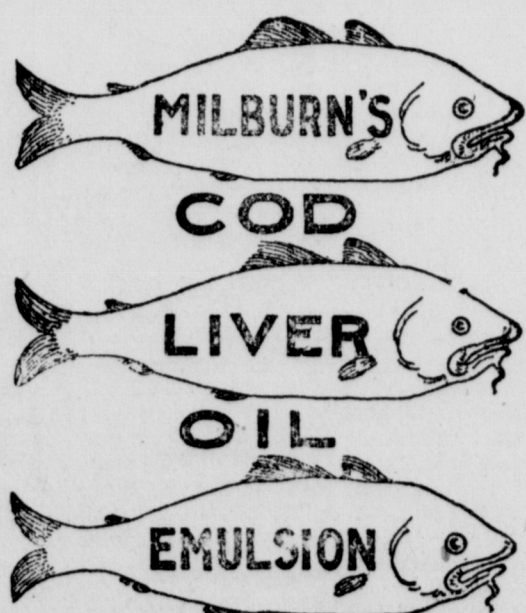
Mrs. Weber, wife of Prof. Weber thanks all who send invitations and takes this way to notify them of her intentions to answer by a personal call in the near future.

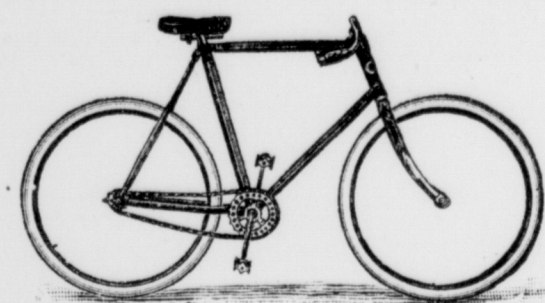
