A GENTLEMAN in this town received a letter quite recently from a relative who is living in Oruro, Bolivia. A very interesting account is given of this southern country. "Oruro is a wretched town of miserably built houses, situated at the base of some high hills in an interminable plain as bare and barren as the desert of Sahara. The streets are of rock, stones and loose sand, and pitch dark at night, the only lighting consisting of a composition candle in a broken lantern about every quarter of a mile. I suffer from the result of the rarified air at this elevation. Its effects are different on different constitutions, some people burst blood vessels and suffer hemorrhage generally, others get racking headaches and go crazy. But the chief symptom is a terrible difficulty in breathing and this is what I suffer from. There is not oxygen enough in the atmosphere to satisfy the requirements of the human respiratory organs and respiration instead of being normal and easy is a constant struggle, and accompanied by a terrible oppression and sense of suffocation."

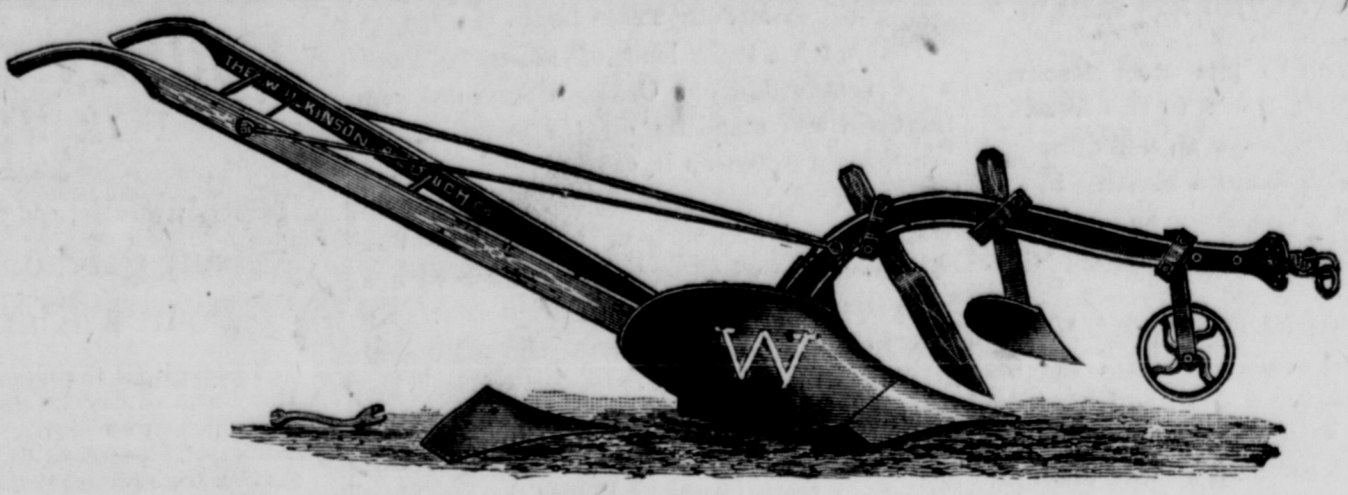
