**Founder of The Jesuits.**

Ignatius Loyola, founder of the Order of Jesuits, born 1491, died July 31, 1556. Loyola was a nobleman and a soldier, brave and accomplished, according to the standard of his day, but unlettered. Being wounded at the siege of Pamplona, in 1521, his recovery was slow and tedious. In reading to beguile the time he fell upon some lives of the saints, and their example stirred in him the desire to lead a life of holiness. He threw into religion all the enthusiasms he had devoted to chivalry. Leaving his home, he made a pilgrimage to Manresa, near Barcelona, served some time in a hospital, and attracted zeal in doing good. He withdrew to a cave, where he lived a life of extreme austerity, meditated, and made the draft of his "Spiritual Exercises." Finding himself hampered by his want of learning, he sat down at thirty-three years of age to learn Latin. After two years of study he held religious conferences among the students at the newly founded University of Alcalá. Here and afterwards at Salamanca he was imprisoned by the Inquisition on suspicion of heresy. In July, 1534, in Paris, he found a plan for a missionary enterprise in the Holy Land. This enterprise being broken off by war between Turkey and Venice, the plan was changed, and the members offered themselves to the Pope to go to any country he might direct. The order was approved in 1640, and Loyola was made the first General. The true name was "Company of Jesus." Calvin is said to have first used the name Jesuits.

**Jewish Courage.**

The conclusion that Jews are cowards is drawn by Prof. Cesare Lombroso from the fact that they furnish few suicides and few soldiers for the armies of Europe. The worthlessness of such an argument is apparent on its face. It assumes that cowardice is the only restraint upon self-destruction, and ignores the restraining influence of ethical and religious ideas. Self-destruction is, in fact, often induced, rather than prevented by cowardice. Many a man takes his own life because he is afraid to face his fellow-men. It is even reported that men have been driven to suicide by terror of death.

The failure of Jews to enlist in the armies of Europe is no better proof of cowardice than their failure to commit suicide. Shameful indignities from almost every European nation have given the Jews too much cause for hatred in lieu of love, and made patriotism well nigh impossible. The enlistment of Jews in our present war against Spain is something for them, and for the nation, to be proud of. It shows they can have patriotism when they have a country.

The umpire at a base ball match has about the most thankless task imaginable. He is clothed with a little brief authority, but is liable to have his head smashed after the game is over and the authority revoked. Fighting and squabbling are as much a part of the base ball game as are pitching and catching, and the poor umpire is abused roundly. The leper cannot change his skin, nor the Ethiopian his spots, and base ball cannot be made, it seems, a healthy game. In St. John recently they had a free fight, and the papers said the game was nearly killed. In Hartland, an aggrieved team left the field in disgust the other day. I confess that it is hard to be patient under what one considers an unjust ruling. But, this must be born in mind, that when you once accept the umpire, his decisions should be final. The same holds good with horse trotting. Many people question very bluntly, a decision given between Rowdy and Calenda, but, here, we must go by the report of the judges, and presume that they are in good faith. If you have not confidence in your judge or umpire before the race or game, enter your protest. Abide by his decisions, if you do not so, and see that he is not an official next time you play, if you can substantiate your charge. There is one thing quite certain, the participant in a game, is not in a position to judge, whereas he always thinks he is the only fair and impartial judge.

I have watched the discussion on the gaol question with a good deal of interest. Coun. Gilmore's last letter in this paper may have been written with the best intentions, but it struck me as a bit far fetched. The old gaol has long outgrown its usefulness, and is not a credit to a well-to-do county like Carleton, but it is neither a "stink pot" nor a "cess pool," or if it is, a great many county tax payers live in just such quarters. There is no use in abusing the bridge that carries you safely over. From gaol to bridges—has no one noticed that the Meguxnakik bridge is in a wretched condition, quite unsafe? must we wait for an election before it is repaired? Has not our rich province lots of money?

I will take second place to no man in my town patriotism and in my desire to see Woodstock develop. I have not the slightest doubt that we will have quite a big town soon. And, we should have a cleaner town. It is not the town council I am going to attack this time, but the individual citizen. We might all join together and promise to keep our town neater and cleaner. A friend from the United States remarked on the prosperous appearance of Woodstock, but was obliged to admit that its appearance in its business section was not up-to-date. We cannot help our principal business street being on a side hill, but by a little co-operation we can clean up the rank grass which disfigures our public highways. It would make the town look a deal better.

Speaking of horse racing, I am glad to see a revival of interest in this good old sport. Mankind must have variety, and the sporting instinct is as much in the man who plays dominoes as in the man who watches a horserace. A good horse race is one of the prettiest things to look at. I think in the world. Never did I look at anything prettier than that fourth heat between Calandra and Rowdy. And how the crowd did cheer. No, the real sporting instinct is not dead in us. And is not horse racing innocent sport? The horses are none the worse. You would watch two boys race at a Sunday school picnic and clap your hands for the winner. Then why object to the horse racing? Oh! you say, there is drinking and betting connected with horse racing. Possibly, but so can there be drinking and betting over two boys running a race or even, over a game of dominoes. I cannot but laugh at some men who attend the races. They will smoke and perhaps risk a quarter in a pool, but their families and friends must not know they were at the "trot." However, that is their business, and not mine. One man guided by his religious belief will not frequent a horse race, and another guided by the same motive, will not eat meat on Friday. Both, at least, are inspired by good motives. But, I must rise to assert that the people must and will have their fun. Had it not been for the dread hypocrisy of Cromwell's rule, his interference with personal liberty, his prohibition of even the most innocent amusement, history would not have to speak of the licentiousness of Charles the second's reign.
