A Long Train.

October 1 was Chicago day at the Trans-Mississippi Exposition in Omaha, and all of the railroads between Chicago and Omaha ran special trains, carrying delegates of the different organizations attending. Among these was a special over the Burlington route, carrying the Cook County democracy, which is said to have been the biggest train of Pullman cars that ever left Chicago. It consisted of 17 Pullman cars, one special private car, one baggage car and two engines. The train shed at the Union passenger station measures 1100 ft., but the train measured exactly 1377 ft. or more that a quarter of a mile long. It started from Omaha at 2.30 p. m., Sept. 30, scheduled to run 40 miles an hour. The weight of this train was estimated to be about 1145 tons. The two engines which pulled the train over the 500 miles to Omaha burned 45 tons of coal and transformed into steam 53,000 gallons of water.

Expansion of Rails by Heat.

At all events the following newspaper reporter's account of what happened in that direction recently should set trackmen to thinking: "At Bellevue the heat so warped the rails that the passing of the train over the main track was made impossible for the time, and a side track was utilized which stood in the shade of the buildings. Near Silver Lake at two different points the rails bent out like a bow and moved the ties over on the road-bed a half foot. The train men, assisted by the passengers, were compelled to use a stout chain to hold the rails in plumb while their train passed over the deflection. The train came to Topeka behind time, and the passengers report a thrilling ride." The method described for holding the rails in alignment is also thrilling, and no doubt comment by one not a spectator of the event would be quite out of place.
