RAILROAD FARES IN AUSTRALIA. Proposals for a Uniform Rate Regardless of Distance.

While the legislation of the Australian colonies is patterned upon English precedent it by no means slavishly follows. In fact it often leads it. A novel proposition in regard to transportation by rail that is being discussed and may before long enter into the sphere of practical politics in that of the colonies is calculated to give conservative hereditary legislators a severe shock. The proposition is that a uniform rate should be charged on railways for both freight and passengers irrespective of distance. The proposal looks at first a little startling but the the more it is examined the more feasible it appears. Its advocates propose to carry a passenger one journey as far as he likes to go for one shilling (25 cents and to haul freight from any point in the interior to the seabord or vice versa for 5 shillings (\$1 25) a ton. It must be remembered that the railways, as also the telegraphs are owned and operated by the Government. The lands also of the interior which are more valuable than those of the coast for wool growing are principally owned by the Government and let on lease to the sheep owners. The rental of these lands is small, owing to the long and expensive land carriage to the point of shipment for wool mutton and beef and the lessees would willingly pay largely enhanced rentals for the proposed reduction in freight. Estimates have been prepared from which the advocates of the new proposal claim that the enhanced revenue from the Government lands would more than compensate the deficiency in operating the Governmert railroads,

They claim too, that it would be the most effective way of settling the interior of the country in small holdings which has always been a difficulty, as the people congregate in the large cities in numbers altogether out of proportion to those who populate the back country. Where The Best Monuments And Head Stones Are Found.


