The Export Egg Trade.

It will be gratifying to those interested to know that our export egg trade so far this season shows considerable improvement over last year for the same period. The total shipments this season from Montreal up to July 23rd were 8,834 cases as compared with 6,299 cases for the same period last year, showing an increase of 2,535 cases, which is very gratifying indeed. The bulk of the shipments this season have gone to Liverpool, while Glasgow has taken a large share. The total exports of eggs from Canada in 1897 were 6,687,690 dozen which amounted in value to \$795,180. The total exports for 1896 were 5,003,170 dozen which amounted in value at 700,284. Our export egg trade has therefore shown a healthy growth for the past two or three years, and if the present rate of shipments continues, 1898 will witness a very large expansion of this important trade.—Sackville Post.

"Progress and Poverty," was the name of a book written by the late Henry George. His contention was that with the advance of progress, went poverty, that they marched side by side, that when you found wealth, the result of progress, in one house, open the next door and you would be confronted with poverty. It is ever so. We have not great wealth in Woodstock, but wealth is a relative expression. We would regard a man in Woodstock as wealthy, whom in London we would call poor. Thus, a man with \$50,000 or so should live in a small place, where the people will bow to him obsequiously, and ponder on the great wealth he possesses. In a big town he will not be noticed. Progress and wealth and poverty and decadence go together. In Woodstock we learn of a family so poor, that they could not afford to buy the milk to sustain life in a dying mother. This in Woodstock, in pious, God-fearing, temperate Woodstock, my good, Christian friends! "I cannot dig, to beg I am ashamed." If our philanthropic people who talk so much of their good deeds, had looked into such a case, they could easily have found means to relieve that would not have hurt pride. One does not wonder that people shun to be aided by good, kind people, who afterwards parade their charity. What we need in this town, and in every town are more people who will give, without declaring their generosity from the house tops. We want more real religion and less sham.

I do not take a great deal of stock in the multiplicity of "societies." We have societies for all kinds of objects, societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals, societies for the removal of drink, societies for all sorts and manners of things, until what with attending society meetings a "joiner" has no time left for the home. There are just two societies I would like to see started in Woodstock. One is a town improvement society, which would have in view the better appearance of the town. They could agree among themselves to tidy up the sidewalks in front of their houses, and use what influence they had, on their neighbors and on the town council. There is a real want for such a society. Another society, I would like to see started, now that the fall is coming on is one for the opening of a public reading room and library. If our young men had a place to go where they could read the papers, of an evening, it would do them good, and the town would be the gainer. People who have illustrated papers, and papers and books, and periodicals which are not illustrated, could donate them, after they had finished with them, and thus a lot of reading matter would be available. Now, how acceptable this reading matter would be to many young men, who have not the means of securing it. I hope that something of this kind may be done this winter. If it was a strictly young men's association there would be no objection to an occasional 'whiff' of the fragrant tobacco in connection with the reading room. Smoking undoubtedly promotes sociability, and as a great writer and student remarked, helps thought. As I said, I think there are about societies enough, but, we might stand one for the promotion of a reading room and library for the coming winter months.

There are duds and duds and because a young fellow is a dude, there is no reason to suppose he is a coward or a fool, any more than to conclude that because a man is slovenly in his dress, and brutal and loose in his language he is therefore brave and wise. History tells us that when the attack was made on Sidon, during the war with Syria, it became necessary for the British troops to advance across a long, unprotected bridge in the face of a battery of six guns, which completely commanded the approach. The men were unwilling to expose themselves to certain death, when Arthur Cumming, carefully dressed in full uniform, stepped forward to the middle of the bridge.
