

The above resolutions were all fully discussed seriatim by gentlemen present and unanimously carried. In the course of discussion, several gentlemen-well known particularly successful with children's temperance men-spoke ably on the different points under review. Mr. Henry Doucette, one of our leading Prohibition advocates referred pointedly to several questions affect ing Premier Laurier's position in respect of Prohibition movement. He had been censured by some for not giving a decided promise. Perhaps this was unavoidable, until the voice of the people was heard a the polls. Some were unwilling to accept Prohibition measure, because, at first blush, it did not appear sufficiently strong-did not embrace every point desired. Well, even if so, if we had not a sharp axe wherewith to chop down a tree we might do so with a dull one. We ought to do what we could with the means and agencies at our disposal. Others saw no use for all this agitation, because they had never been injured by rum, either they had never had any taste or longing for it-had never fallen under the power of temptation. Neither he nor any of his name had ever been seduced or suffered from the baneful fascination of liquor or the blight of the liquor traffic; but others undoubtedly had, either from hereditary liking, from debauching surroundings, from ungovernable passion, or from weakness of principle, which was unable to repel the wiles of the tempter in the evil day. He was anxious and so licitous for the salvation of others as of those of his own house-to bring others into that ark of safety, in which he and his felt themselves safe. He had seen much of the ruinous influence of rum on men, both old and young, in winter seasons especially on the Miramichi and Bristol roads, and was determined to do all in his power to redeem and to save. No man should live to himself, but should be ever ready to lend a helping hand to rescue a falling brother, when sinking under the overwhelming flood of intemperance, that was sweeping over the length and breadth of the land.

Mr. Noble Branscombe congratulated the meeting on the great privilege Government was giving them in voting at the plebiscitegreat privilege and an important one. We were all emphatically called upon to do our duty on the 29th Sept. We had not only our own interests to conserve, but those of our children and our children's children.

Mr. Roland Kinney believed that the time had at last come for putting down the liquor traffic with a strong hand and wiping off its foul stain from our national and social institutions. If the liquer traffic was not stamped out, it was impossible to foresee with what tremendous evil consequences it might be fraught in the future, even to generations yet unborn. 
