We narrowly escape being in for another murder trial. About half a mile across the boundary, a sad tragedy occurred. A son murders his father in the most cold blooded manner, the details of the crime being revolting to a degree. With this, the State of Maine will have to deal, although the murdered man is a native of Woodstock, and only left here a few weeks ago. The son or sons who committed the deed come perilously near being blue noses, if they are not subjects of Her Gracious Majesty. They, at least, are safe from the fear of the hangman's noose, for Maine has abolished the death penalty.

The question of religious instruction in schools will always remain debateable. We say that it is better to have no religious instruction than to have religious instruction what may be offensive to any of the scholars or to the scholars' parents. Let the Sunday schools do the work is the cry. If there are no Sunday schools what? However, it it is quite a problem. A correspondent "Arichat" writes to Le Moniteur Acadian of the 7th inst, a long letter on education of the young, from the point of view of a large section of the French Acadians. Arichat makes several good points against the neutral schools. He says that in these schools the infant is taught about the cat, the dog, the horse, that a cat has so many claws, etc. Here is how morals are taught he says. To a scholar it is said "If you tell me the truth I will give you poison." Continuing, this writer speaks of the privilege accorded in some places of teaching religion after the devout to teaching him about God. All these arguments have more or less weight. The effect upon the rising generation cannot be other than to belittle the importance of religion. It cannot be the great thing to learn, or it would be taught in the schools.

There are healthy symptoms of a desire among our councillors and citizens generally to improve the appearance of the town. A well-disposed stranger who was here the other day remarked to me about the untidy appearance of Main Street. He spoke as he looked out from the Carlisle Hotel, and with the same breath he spoke of the fine residences, and the well kept lawns surrounding them. The worst of it is that many visitors to the town see only the Queen street station. the hotels and Main or Queen streets, and certainly the impression one would form of the town from such an acquaintance, is not likely to be pleasing. And one does not like to be called upon to apologize for the appearance of the town, to every stranger one meets. Of course one may tell these critical strangers that they need not visit the town, that if Woodstock doesn't suit them they may stay away, and perhaps this would be the better plan to adapt. But, when the town council admit that the town is not kept as it should be, we must admit that strangers are not unreasonable. A good move has been made in deciding upon a curb for the Main street sidewalks. When we make a good job of our sidewalks, the business portion of the town will look very different. The inferiority of the buildings on Main street, is something we must make the best of. Atter all, they are better than handsome buildings, covered over with mortgages.
