Fleet Of Yukon Steamers.

The twelve flat-bottom boats which we mentioned in our issue of Dec. 25, last, as under construction for the Yukon trade, have been completed and were to leave Seattle during this week for the mouth of that river. The vessels will propel themselves over the 3000 mile ocean trip to St. Michael. For this purpose they were heavily loaded with cork wood. Two powerful ocean tugs are in convoy of the fleet with five large river barges in tow. The boats will not put out to sea, but follow close to the shore line. They will go in and out of the deeper bays like Prince William sound. The boats are due at St. Michael the latter part of June, and Moran Bros., the builders, think the trip can be made in 25 days. In case of an emergency the tugs will be able to handle any of the steamers that may be disabled. The ocean tug New England left Seattle May 22 with a heavy tow of the steamers Rock Island No. 2, en route to St. Michael. She is also following the coast line as nearly as possible. Both steamers had their stern wheels unshipped. These two river steamers were built by the Rock Island Company of Chicago.—Railway News.
