Cattle Would Sell.

There is a great lack of live stock in this county. And our farmers suffer by it, and have no one to blame but themselves. The Sussex Record says:—

The Americans seem to have an eye for what the New Brunswick farmer wants to sell. Within a few days upwards of 75 choice milch cows have been purchased by Messrs. Flagg & Brown, of Auburn, Maine. These animals have all been purchased of farmers in the vicinity of Sussex where the very best class of cows are kept. The price paid has been equal to what is generally obtained in the spring of the year and was of course more than what was realized in the past at any autumn sales. Messrs. Flagg & Brown have also entered upon the purchase of a number of live geese and turkeys, which went forward with 36 of the cows above referred to.

BEAT NEW BRUNSWICK

In The Number of Statutes Passed Each Year.

A gentleman name Mr. Means gave a lecture in Boston on "The Essentials of Government by the People." There are some criticisms very applicable to this country and province. The lecturer says the Boston Herald, dealt with corruption in this country, giving a large number of examples taken from the states of New York and Pennsylvania, and laying emphasis on the perfection to which its machinery had been brought. Not the least evil arising out of the present state of things, he said, was our imperfect administration of justice. There was a failure to enforce lawful contracts, and a failure to deal effectually with crime. Meanwhile, we were being encumbered with hosts of statutes which ought not to have been enacted. A single Legislature sometimes enacted 1000 statutes at one sitting. The need of the day was for scientific legislation. Yet we could not get it because the legislators did not know enough. Men who did not know enough were not legislators, and did not want to be, or would not be elected if they did. The other sciences of the time were far in advance of the science of government. And when we realized the conditions of life, and how much its hardships were increased by bad government, we could not but feel that a thorough examination of our political system was demanded.

The Trans-Siberian Railway.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 18.—Count John Thun, Austria, came in on the Empress of China from Yokohama. Last May he left his home at Cohiltz, Bohemia, and went by way of Vienna and Berlin to St. Petersburg; thence he went to Moscow, and after necessary preparations started upon the hazardous journey over the Czar's Trans-Siberian Railroad. From Moscow he proceeded by easy stages to Irkutsk without mishap. For some two hundred versts beyond Irkutsk the journey was full of great peril and it required nine days and nights of hard travelling, sometimes mounted, but the greater part afoot, to encompass the distance. Work upon this part of the road had been well advanced a year or so ago, but an era of unprecedented storms set in and embankments and bridges to the value of about 43,000,000 roubles were washed away. The work of restoring them during the past summer was completely interfered with by swarms of insects and other pests, which made it impossible for men to work. Reaching the eastern division of the road finally, he came on to Vladivostok and thence to Japan. Count Thun says it is intensely cold all along the line of road, and for the most part a barren and utterly desolate country. A region some two hundred versts in extent in each direction north of Manchuria, in China is undoubtedly full of almost inexhaustible gold fields, but the extreme cold will not permit them to be worked for more than three months in the year, and that length of time is very uncertain. The railway will, he thinks, be complete in two years and will be valuable chiefly for the movement of soldiers. He is going east over the C. P. R.

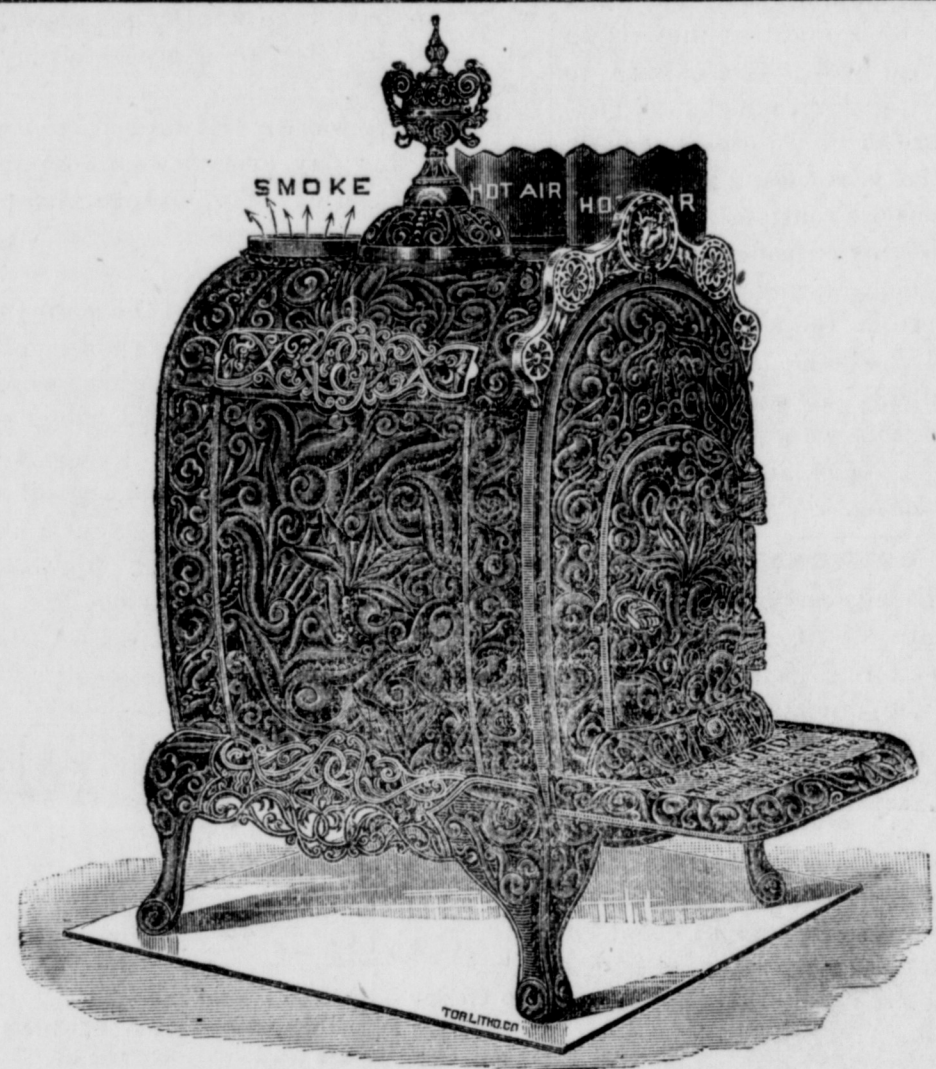

London's Sunday.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Intense interest has been aroused by the Puritanical decision of the licensing committee of the London County Council to refuse licenses to halls where Sunday concerts are given for profit. This will practically mean the abolition of Sunday concerts, which have brightened the London Sunday for the past few years and which even their opponents admit always consist of the highest class of music. The

newspapers are unanimous in denouncing the decision and demand that the London County Council refuse to ratify it.

The Queen gives a snub to the opponents of Sunday music by having the Guards' band play on the terrace at Windsor Castle every Sunday afternoon while she resides there. The public is then admitted to the castle grounds, and, on Sunday last, for instance, a large concourse of people listened to the music.
