

A Gigantic Bog Oak.

An extraordinary discovery, and one which is just now exciting considerable interest in antiquarian circles in Lancashire and Cheshire has been made at Stockport. During the excavations in the construction of sewage works for the town, some workmen came across what has since proved to be a massive oak tree with two immence branches. Professor Boyd Dawkins, the well known antithe giants of prehistoric times, and he says that the tree is certainly 10,000 years old. The corporation of Stockport are at loss what to do with the gigantic fossil, which is supposed to weigh about 40 tons, and as it is necessary that it should be removed, a proposition has been made to blow it up with dynamite. That as for artistic work alone it is greatly to be treasured; for nothing in this country is at present grown which can come up to its dimentions. That it contains within itself sufficient material to make the furniture for any public building or town hall which may be erected for the public benefit within our borough. That it only requires lifting from its bed, which, in the opinion of competent geologists, may, be roughly estimated at 15,000 years of occupation. That private effort has failed to achieve its removal. That its destruction would be a public loss and an artistic calamity. That your representatives in council be, and are hereby requested to conserve for the borough this grant of nature to her sons and daughters, whose signatures are hereby affixed."-Canada Lumbermen.

Dorojynski, who went to England, to buy a high-class racer, saw many of the English cracks, including Cyllene, Ayrshirs, Raeburn, and Dieudonne, but directly his eyes rested on Galtee More he would have nore of the others, holding they sank into insignificance beside the son of Kendal. For Kendal, by the way, Mr. Gubbins received another sum, amounting to nearly twenty thousands pounds. M. Dorojynski was determined that Galtee More should be secured, but Mr. Gubbins, his owner, apparently had no desire to sell the horse; hence a deadlock. This form was looked upon in many quarters as wrong, but when the two horses met again as three-year-olds it was amply verified, and Galtee More won what is in Turf parlance called the Triple Crown-namely, the Two Thousand Guineas, Derby, and St. Leger. The New Wheat Crop.

The American crop is estimated at 675,000,000 bushels, or about one-fourth of the total output. 


