He expects to have skimming stations at Canterbury Station and Debec.

What Are They Fighting For.

General Lee is a fair sample of the Yankee jingo patriots who are bringing the American people into ridicule and exciting the laughter and contempt of all the European nations. The Spaniards are few and poor, the Yankees are numerous and rich, but the Spaniards are brave, and their opportunities of resistance are so favorable that the American brag will have ample time and space in which to exhaust itself.
