It is said that an ostrich hides its head in the sands of the desert and then confidently believes that as he can see nothing, nothing can see it. I often think that men and communities act very much like the ostrich. For instance, there is a good deal of grumbling amongst business men in town. Men in the stores talk depression for all they are worth. At the same time when they meet together to talk of starting new industries, or doing anything to boom the place, they say, we must not have it noised abroad business is in a bad state. Do they really think that they can talk as if the town was going to the dogs, and at the same time expect that the outside world hears nothing of their lamentations? Commercial travellers come to town, and the merchant refuses to buy, because times are hard. Does the merchant not know that the commercial traveller is the news carrier of the age. And, then, the newspapers are exhorted to say nothing about vacant houses, lest it get abroad that Woodstock is going backward. Now, I do not believe that Woodstock is going behind. I do believe that we are undergoing severe business depression, which I hope and think is but temporary. But, the moment I am convinced that Woodstock is going behind, the truth will come out in these columns. I, for one, will go in for no ostrich policy, because it is, simply, of no use.

The fences around dwelling houses are likely to disappear, although the reform will be worked gradually as all reforms are worked here. We might as well make up our minds to it that we are an intensely conservative people. The people who settled this country were conservative, in name and in their ways. Their successors in town and country have inherited their ways, although a good many of them call themselves liberal. In little things, we particularly show our conservatism. Take standard time. It won't work here, and no one is foolish enough to advocate it. In Houlton they have only one time—standard—because as they told me, two times are a nuisance, a much more nuisance than one time, a little slower than we would like. Again the court house and gaol matter. They have been at Upper Woodstock, and, therefore, should always be there. Our fathers inclosed their properties with fences, therefore we should have fences. We talk about conservatism in the old country. I doubt if in all England there is a more decidedly conservative town than Woodstock, N. B. There is a good side as well as a bad side to this ultra—conservatism.

We are very apt to form hasty judgments of individuals. For instance, does not every one think that Gen. Weyler, the Spanish governor-general of Cuba, before the war, is a most brutal person, a regular butcher in appearance and manner. It appears that an American disguised as a German professor became friendly with Gen. Weyler. This secret service man says:—"The general's plot did not reveal the remains of a Cuban baby-pie, his eyes did not flash red fire, he did not browbeat his company, his conversation was not a combination of curses and boasts. . . .
