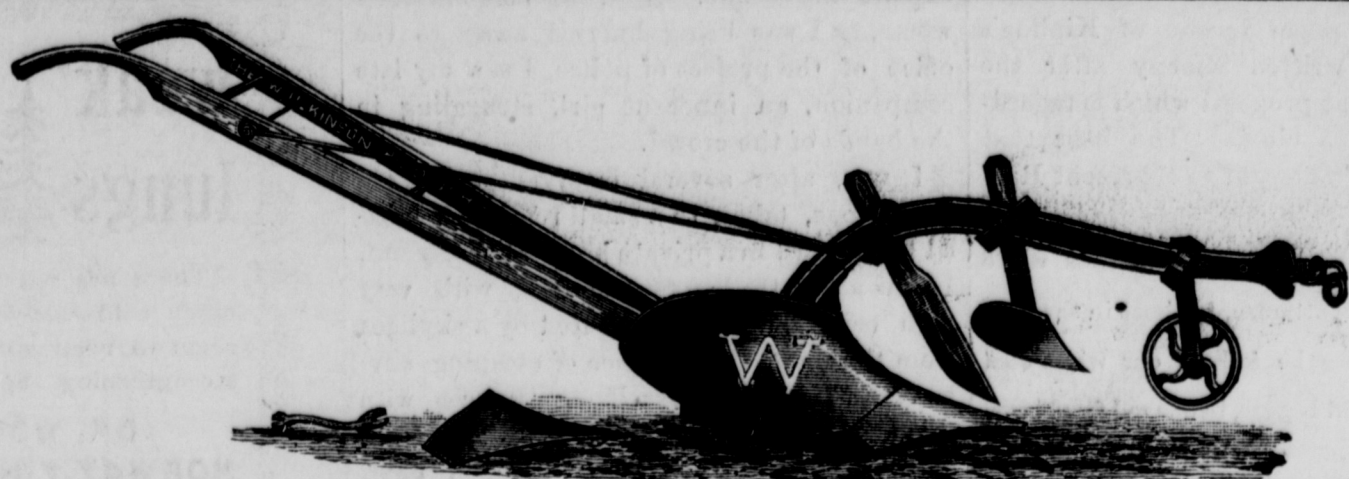
A NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C. paper of a quite recent date contained an account of the death of J. N. Draper, a well known and generally esteemed pioneer resident. The late J. N. Draper was born in Woodstock, New Brunswick, in 1834. He was educated at Woodstock Grammar School and at Kings College, Fredericton, N. B. He came to British Columbia as early as 1858, and to New Westminster in 1859. After remaining here a short time he went to Puget Sound, and engaged in the sawmill business, returning to this city in 1877, and has been with Messrs. Even and Co. ever since. He also held the position of harbor master of this port for the last twenty years or more. Mr. Draper was married at Victoria in March, 1862, to Katherine Vickery, of St. John, N. B. who with two daughters and one son all residents of this city, are left to mourn his loss.—Ex. The older residents of Woodstock remember Mr. Draper very well. He has a brother the head of the firm of George Draper and Son who is engaged in the milling business in Southampton.
