It was discovered by a gentleman who was coming to court. He quickly gave the alarm and soon enough men were on the scene to save most of the household effects. About 400 barrels of potatoes were destroyed and all the furniture in the kitchen. The fire is supposed to have caught in the cook room. The loss is estimated at \$2000, insurance \$500.

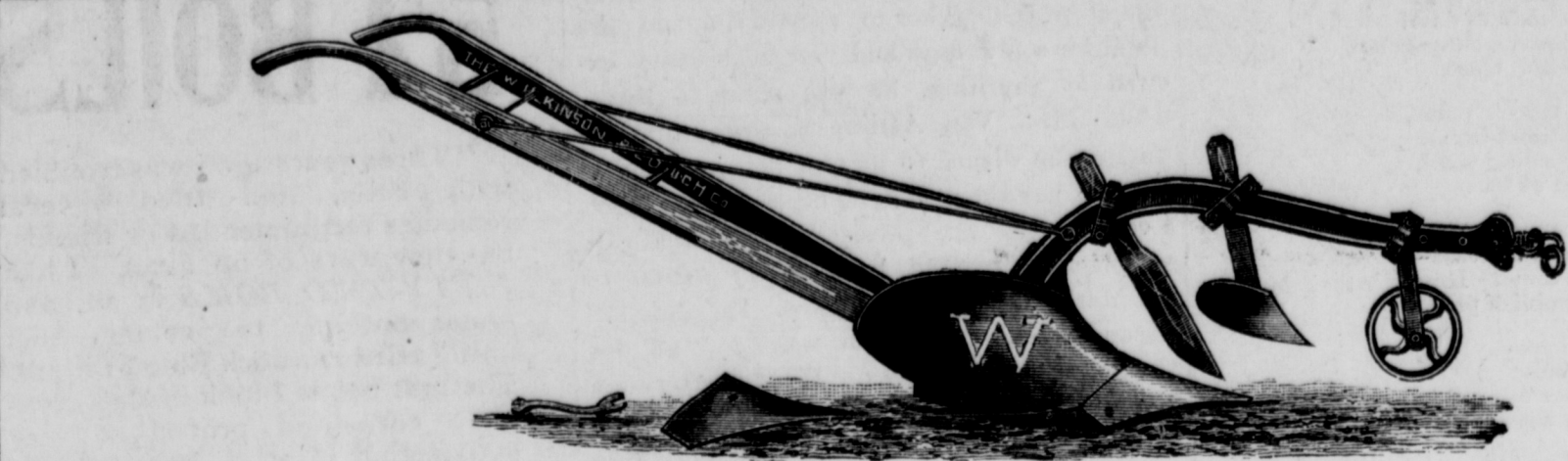
