

A French Duel.

M. Max Regis the Algiers agitator, had duel with M. Picard, a journalist. Max Regis then, according to the long circumstancial account in the Temps, exclaimed, "There it is, is it not?" The seconds undressed M. Picard, who bore no trace of a wound. The blade was more rectangular, but instead of having hollow backs, they were flat. The guards were enormous, toes and one rudimentary. covering the hand up to the wrist. They though they had been used before, yet it was incentestable that they were not of an ordinary pattern. M. Picard's seconds, as they had a right to do, refused to consent to their use, and after 20 minutes it was agreed that the duel should be adjourned until enabled to see above his head. Tuesday. M. Regis, meanwhile, was walking up and down with his overceat over his shoulders considerably excited and exclaiming "A bas les juifs! A bas les juifs! une fois pour toutes!" and "When people want to fight, all swords are good enough! Down with cowards!" M. Dubois replied, "If your swords had been presentable the duel would have gone on." M. Picard, very pale, was held back all this time by his seconds. Those of M. Max Regis tried in vain to calm him, and even when M. Picard left the building with his friends M. Regis and some of his friends continued to utter the same cries. After the meeting of the four seconds in the evening, the seconds of M. Picard at their client's desire said that they would not make these unseemly incidents the subject of a demonstration, and it was agreed that the duel should be resumed next day.

The second meeting accordingly took place next afternoon at the Pistes Fleuries, between Neuilly and Levallois, in the open air, and the duel was visible from the surrounding roofs. The encounter was extremely hot. An eye-witness states that in the first round Death Longed for as a Reit was M. Picard who made the most vigorous attack, M. Regis parrying constantly. This first engagement lasted only about a minute, being interrupted by M. Dubois's "Halte!" when the two swords touched the ground. The second round was just as lively, and ended when a close encounter was imminent. Again M. Dubois separated the two adver saries, who were examined by the surgeons, M. Picard being found to have been slightly touched on his left cheek, and M. Regis having a small gash on his chin. After a few moments' rest, the duel was resumed. M. Regis, changing his tactics, rushed on his adversary and, after a few rapid passes, drove him against a boundary wall. A close encounter followed, which was fought so furiously on both side that the swords seemed to be plunged into the two bodies. This put an end to the duel, and, M. Dubois having separated the two men, M. Picard was found to have received in the sternum above the epigastric region a wound 11 centimetre deep which sufficed to put him in a condition of evident inferiority. The swords had been bent in this melee.-London Times.

A Clerical Prince,

When Prince Max of Saxony was ordained a priest a couple of years ago it was surmised that he would soon tire of his newly-assumed functions. For Prince Max, a nephew of the reigning King Albert of Saxony, is but 28, had been a dashing Uhlan officer, and the gayety of his life and the natural warmth of his temperament did not seem to predispose him for the priesthood. In 1892 when he was present as an honored guest at the wed ding of the Duchess of Urach in Munichi, it was generally remarked how much he seemed to enjoy life and his high positon. A few days ago he delivered a remarkable sermon on the duties which the rich and high born owe to their less favored brethren, and the place where he delivered it was remarkable, for it was the famous Theatine Court Church in Munich, before a congregation made up of the very flower of Bavaria's aristocracy.
