CHINESE ETIQUETTE.

The Russians Make Further Study of Oriental Peculiarities.

The Russians have been making some study of Chinese manners and etiquette, and their periodicals are reporting what has been learned. The latest number of Ruskii Viestnik says it is not surprising that the Celestials consider Europeans barbarians when they see continually what they consider bad manners and breaches of etiquette on the part of white men. The proper thing, according to the Chinese notion, is diametrically opposed to the European idea. For instance, when a Chinese welcomes a visitor to his house, he does not remove his hat, if he happens to have it on, He puts his hat on if he is caught without it. The seat of honor at the table is at the left of the host. It would be considered an offence if the guest inquired about the health of the hostess, or, still worse, expressed a desire to be presented to her. A Chinese takes offence if told that he looks younger than he is. The older the man the more he is respected, independently of his qualities, and, therefore, a Chinese wishes to appear older than he really is. He willingiy forgives many offences, but should any one happen to tread on his foot he will refuse to accept the most humble apologies. When a son dies in a Chinese family the bereaved father considers it proper to show strangers a smiling countenance, no matter what his sufferings may be.

The Russian newspaper asserts that there is a minister of etiquette in China known as Lispu. Ancient books on manners are accepted by him as authority. The books include 200 volumes. Some of the rulers are Draconian in their severity. A Chinese cannot even build a house according to his taste, No matter how rich he is it is not proper for him to build a finer or a higher house than that of his neighbor if the latter happens to be of superior rank socially. In Chinese etiquette there are eight varieties of the bow. Ignorance of Chinese ideas of propriety with regard to the bow has often caused embar-

A Chinese, displeased with his situation, will not tell his employer the real reason for resigning, but will give poor health or the death of a relative as a pretext for leaving. Such things have led many persons to regard the Chinese as insincere. But this does them injustice. They are also unjustly considered of character with which this race is endowed.


Horseshoes of Rubber.

Horses whose owners are rich enough may wear rubber-tyred shoes. The entire shoe is about three times as thick as the ordinary iron shoe, but it is not at all heavy, as a large portion of it is hollowed out to make a groove in which to set the rubber tyre. The tyre is made of very hard rubber, and is about half an inch in diameter. The inner circumference of the shoe is fitted with nine prongs, turned into the rubber and serve to hold it in place. When the prongs are turned into place the rubber stands about one-eighth of an inch above the shoe, and as it wears away a new rubber can be substituted, or the old tyre allowed to remain. In either case it has been found by usage that the shoe will wear as long as the old shoe.



It is not wise, I think to make light of the

coming Peace conference, an outcome of the proposition made by the Czar of Russia. True, we may look for no sudden disarmament, no rapid effects of the conference. But it is bound to leave an impression not alone upon those who attend, but upon all those who will read the accounts of the proceedings. Nothing can ever make out of war, anything but a grievous evil, necessary, often, I daresay, but I venture to think more frequently, in the past, undertaken, when there was no real necessity for such an extreme resort. The result of the Spanish-American war will make statesmen pause ere they call their countries to arms. Spain is vanquished and comes out of the battle stripped of almost all her choice possessions-America conquering and triumphant is troubled with an embarrassment of riches. Who can think that that nation who for more than a century past was great in her very isolation, really gains anything by the acquisition of the Phillipines? No wise citizen of the United States can think so, surely. With such a possession as the Phillipines, thousands of miles away, where is the United States' security in a war with a foreign nation, unless she increases her navy to an enormous extent. As the century draws near its end, and we start upon a new century, we may certainly hope that as medical science is adding to the happiness of human life, as a sense of our common brotherhood is making men recognise their kin even among those whom they do not know, so those who have the holding and the loosing of the dogs of war, will add new strength to the chains, that keep these hideous and awful monsters from whetting their destroying appetites.

In dealing with this question of war, we must be careful to see that our youths in their dread of it do not become effeminate. So long as human nature is as it is, all must be ready to protect their homes. The highest type of man is he who will sacrifice himself for others, he who will undergo pain, that it may be averted from others. This individual fear of suffering and pain, it is hard to overcome, and yet heroism of this kind is more often found in the quiet homes of the quiet people than on the battlefield. There will always be ample scope for this true bravery, this true heroism. They who wish to be heroes, need not wait for war to break out. Citizens of all countries and all nations, therefore, who have the interests of humanity at heart will look for something tangible towards the peace of the world from the Peace conference soon to assemble.

A motion has been introduced into the House of Commons, having for its object the cutting down of the speeches, the shortening of debates. It certainly is a consummation devoutly to be wished for. But, like prohibition, it may prove impracticable. The only real way, I am assured, to lessen the number of aimless, useless, wearisome speeches that take place at Ottawa, is by the electors impressing upon the members that the time taken up in these tedious speeches is all lost. If a member has anything new to say, he can say it in ten minutes, at the outside. Why waste an hour in repeating what every man of the same political hue has already put on the pages of Hansard? Still Parliament is a very supreme court, and I doubt if any motion such as here referred to will pass. The members who talk at all want to talk a long time, and the idea of a closure is highly unpopular. The members must receive their instructions from the electors before we will have a Parliament, in which most of the speeches are woath hearing. THE IMP.


