Irrigation for Fruit.

I believe that apples and plum trees will bear full crops every year if they are simply supplied with water and manure. Two years ago I put up a wind pump for irrigating which raised 120 barrels of water an hour in a good breeze.

Having plenty of water at hand I put 10,000 barrels of water on half an acre of plum orchard and about the same amount on the apple orchard. I had a large crop of both kinds of fruit that year. This season, where I irrigated most the previous one, I had a full crop of plums and where I irrigated only a few. Where I did not irrigate I had nothing at all. It is exactly the same with the apples. My orchard land is pure sand. In dry seasons it suffers very much from drouth, the plums and apples falling off badly.—Henry Wade, Nova Scotia in American Agriculturist.

Dairying Dots. In an investigation in Ontario by the agricultural college it was found that out of 170 dairy farmers, 140 used great foddere, the most common combination of foddere consisting of oats and peas, or oats and tares for summer feed, with corn for autumn. A large number used corn alone.

If the cream is thick and rich, it should be cool when put into the churn. If it is thin, poor cream, the temperature should be at least sixty degrees. If the cow or cows are near being fresh the cream will sometimes not churn easily. The bubbles that form on cream when it is churning are caused by it being either too hot or too cold.

That many farmers are becoming awake to the importance of more rapid work in the manipulation of milk and cream is shown by the large number of separators which have been purchased by them within the past year and a half. Many small dairies of eight to a dozen cows operate a separator and find it pays. The hand power machine still finds a place on the farms, but the practice is changing to larger machines run by a chesp tread-power, which a dog, sheep or bull is trained to operate.

Cattle that are being forced to their full capacity for milk production require a lower temperature than cows moderately kept. For instance, at the Michigan Agricultural College there is a cow that weighs something like 2,050 or 2,100 pounds, that gives (so says Prof. C. D. Smith) one hundred pounds of milk each day. This cow (from the same authority) actually has to be kept in a cool place, for she consumes so much food that she is a good-sized furnace within herself, and would not consume food enough in a warm room to produce the one hundred pounds per day.

To Cure Creaky Shoes.

"Cheap shoes are not necessarily of poor material," said a shoe store clerk. "Creaking often accounts for the low price. Cheap double soled shoes nearly always creak, and the reason is that the two soles do not quite fit or one is of more pliable material than the other, so that they rub against each other. Among the remedies usually tried is soaking the shoe in water or oil. This is effective for a time, but the cure is only temporary. The creak invariably returns in a few days. However, there is one certain and simple remedy. It is to drive three little wooden pegs into the sole. The pegs prevent the friction of the soles.
