"IN DARK QUEBEC."

Certain people in our county and elsewhere in English speaking Canada, make a point of decrying Quebec, as a place where ignorance prevails, and where the darkness is so black that it is visible. Few, who speak so have ever visited this very interesting province.

If they did, it is probable they would form a different opinion.

The Quebec Legislature is in session just now, and it is quite apropos to remark that its proceedings seem to be conducted with quite as much dignity, and its members appear to display quite as much learning and ability, as is so plainly the case among our choice legislators at Fredericton.

The members of the Quebec legislature are able to read and write. To be sure the proceedings are carried on in a language, which according to public opinion in this county, is more or less barbarous—the French language, although it is a bit humiliating to think that the English language is largely derived from this barbarous tongue.

Now there is another matter in which the province of Quebec plainly proves itself to be far behind New Brunswick. A bill has been introduced and will become law, whereby free text books are given in the public schools, to the pupils in the primary grades. Free school books,—and in dark Quebec, too. Spirit of Clytenstorides — Sarchides!! And, we have to pay for our text books in enlightened Blue Nose land.

Certainly, certainly, as Mr. Kipling would say, Quebec is very much in the dark.

The Proposed Duty on Corn.

The proposal to levy a shilling duty on wheat in Great Britain is more than a local question. It is one of Imperial interest, and the Dominion of Canada may be as vitally affected by such a measure as the Mother Country itself. For we pre suppose that, in the event of the duty being imposed, it will not be made applicable to this country, or to any other part of the Empire. The imposition of a duty on wheat may be made to serve the double purpose of raising sufficient money for the maintenance of the army and navy, and what is equally important, for the encouragement of wheat production within the Empire. It was a most humiliating statement that Mr. Ritchie, the President of the Board of Trade, made the other week, when he admitted that in the event of war with a European nation Great Britain would be dependent upon the United States for its food supplies. What would happen if war, instead of being with a European nation, was with the United States? Such a contingency is, we hope, not probable, but it is always possible, and especially so if the one country knows that the other is dependent upon it for the food it consumes. We imagine that British statesmen are beginning to perceive that the dependency of the county upon the United States for its food supplies is as vital a weakness as would be an insufficiency of money to properly equip the navy. When the imposition of the proposed duty on wheat is taken up in a practical way, and in earnest, as it will be before long, the Government will no doubt adjust the duty in such a way as to raise a sufficient revenue, and at the same time stimulate the production of wheat within the Empire. The two birds can easily be killed with the one stone. The placing of a duty on wheat would be beneficial to Great Britain and Canada and every other part of the Empire.—Toronto World.

Notice of Legislation.

Application will be made to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, at its next session for legislation to amend and add to the Act incorporating the Town of Woodstock, and Acts in amendment thereof, in the following manner:—

To change the appointment of Assessors for the said Town so that the said Assessors shall not be appointed from each separate ward of the said Town, but shall be appointed from the Town, regardless of the ward in which they reside.

To exempt the Town property situate within the county from taxation by the Parish or County, for Parish or County purposes.

To authorize the Town to take a sum not exceeding \$50,000 in stock in a public hall or any other industry approved by the Town Council, and issue debentures thereof. No money to be so expended until the expenditure is approved by the majority vote of the property of the Town.

To render a Town Councillor for the Town disqualified from acting as County Councillor for the same time and vice versa.

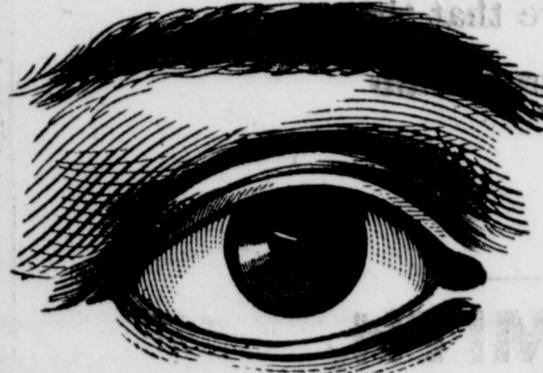
