FOOD VALUE OF EGGS.

At 12 Cents a Dozen They Are a Cheap Nutrient; Extravagant at 25.

The agricultural department, through its experiment stations, has been investigating the food value of hen's eggs. According to a large number of analyses made of American eggs at the various stations, an egg on an average weighs two ounces, and has the following percentage of composition: Shell, 10.5; water, 66; fat, 9.3; and ash, 0.9. A side of beef contains on an average about the same percentage of protein, but a larger percentage of fat. Eggs belong to the nitrogenous group of foods and would naturally and quite properly be combined in the diet with materials supplying carbohydrates (sugar and starch) such as cereals, potatoes, etc. At the California experiment station the chief object of the examination was to determine whether there was any basis of fact for the popular opinion that eggs with brown shells are richer than the white ones, but this statement is not borne out by a chemical analysis and the physical examination proves that the main points of superiority, though extremely slight, are possessed by the white eggs. The minute differences that are found between the two groups are exceeded by variation between varieties with the same group. It may be stated that there are practically no differences so far as the food value is concerned.

The Michigan station made tests of the effect of the character of rations on the composition of eggs, but no marked variation was observed. In connection with other works the digestibility of eggs was studied at the Minnesota station, and it was found that the protein of eggs either soft or hard boiled was entirely digested in five hours, the method of cooking having some effect upon the rate of digestibility, but not materially affecting the total digestibility. The results agree quite closely with those reported some years ago by Rubner, a German investigator, who found that 97.1 of the protein of hard-boiled eggs was digested. Digested experiments were made at the University of Tennessee with healthy men on a diet of bread, milk and eggs, and it was found that from 90 to 94 per cent. of the protein and fat was digested, which warrants the conclusion that eggs do really possess the high nutritive properties which are popularly supposed to belong to them. From its investigations as to the kinds and amounts of food consumed by persons engaged in various occupations and the relative cost of such foods the department finds that, compared with other food at the usual prices, eggs at 12 cents per dozen are a cheap source of nutrients; at 16 cents per dozen they are fairly expensive, while at 25 cents a dozen and over they are extravagant.

I notice that Mr. Goldwin Smith writes, from his home in Toronto to the London Times, a letter in which he attacks the system of party government. He thinks it has fulfilled its usefulness, and should be dispensed with. Speaking of conditions in Canada he says that no question of principle divides the parties, and that party spirit is kept alive by those who are interested in the offices and spoils. All this may be true to a certain extent. But are there no differences between the two parties in the Dominion politics. Is not one a free-trade and the other a protectionist party? Or does it all depend on whether one is in or out of office? Party government may seem an inconsistent thing, an anomaly, but our whole constitution is an anomaly, and as Macaulay says there is no reason to abolish an anomaly unless it comes to be a grievance. There is no party government in city councils—or there is not supposed to be and yet all big cities have boodling stories to relate of these administrative bodies. We want the party government as much for the good, healthy, strong opposition as for anything else. It is not easy to do anything very crooked at Ottawa without it becoming known. Perhaps, not as much can be said for our local legislatures.

Some people criticise me because I speak my mind frankly as to the appearance of Woodstock, and the room for improvement therein. They say, even if things are not as they should be, nothing should be said of it, because outsiders will form a poor opinion of the place. What I am trying to do, as far as in my humble way, I can, is to get the town's people so to improve Woodstock that the outsider will have no cause for anything but favourable criticism. When this paper compares Houlton and Woodstock, as far as appearances go, to the detriment of the latter, it is accused of being "ashamed of Woodstock." Well! I am quite willing to admit, that as far as the appearance of Woodstock goes, there is good cause for a Woodstocker to be ashamed. No one has ever written in this paper, claiming anything but the right of Woodstock to a place in the first rank of hustling towns. Perhaps we are so busy hustling that we haven't time to change our old clothes for new. The fact remains that we wear old shabby clothes,—I am using a figure of speech, mind—and the stranger within our gates will judge by the outward appearance, even, if it be not righteous judgment.

A resident of this province now, for some time making his home with Uncle Sam, remarked to me that any man with any feeling at all always looked forward to spending his latter days in the land where he spent his first. I cannot but notice in the letters received from young men out West a sentiment implying hunger, as it were, for a sight of the old home sod. No matter how well they do, most of them desire to come home at some time. I met one soulless cuss once who said he never wished to live in or even visit N. B. again. Fortunately his kind is rare. Wherever a man has spent his boyhood days, there he is apt to turn when his second childhood comes, if not in the earlier days of his life.
