The Potato Bug.

Experiments were conducted last season at the Guelph Experiment Station.

For two years in succession at Guelph, ex periment has been made to ascertain the rel ative difference in actual experience from treating potatoes differently in order to kill the potato beetle, and also to determine the actual results in the crops produced from the potatoes thus treated. The experiment was conducted in duplicate each year. In every instance some were left untreated, and the potato beetles allowed to eat at pleasure. Another plot in each experiment was treated with a compound which is sold upon the market under the name of "potato bug finish," and the other two plots were treated with Paris green, mixed either with plaster or with water. The application was made four times in 1897 and three in 1898. The tops of the vines where no treatment was used were, of course, nearly all destroyed, and those upon which Paris green were used with water were the freest from the ravages of the beetles, showing it to be superior to the "Potato Bug Finish."

SOME PHENOMENAL FAMILIES.

A Mother of Sixty-Two Children.

France would not be able to complain of a decreasing population if it had many married couples as prolific as the Scotch weaver and his wife, whose family record is treasured in the British Museum. This humble couple during their married life added no fewer than sixty-two children to the population of the British Isles; and of these half a hundred lived to man's and woman's estate.

a family was solved by Sir J. Bowers and three other gentlemen of estate, each of whom adopted a batch of ten boys, and became responsible for their upbringing; while the parents thus relieved of forty of their offspring, were able to bring up the rest. The descendants of the weaver and his wife, who chiefly settled in Northumberland, now prob-

ably number hundreds of thousands. One of the most astonishing of "family" records is claimed by a Mr. and Mrs. Jefferies, of Lawrenceburg, Kentucky. For six years no child came to call this couple blessed; but when the first one made his appearance, no fewer than eighteen others followed him within fifteen years; and of these fourteen were twins. No fewer than four of the children were born within eleven months: and it is interesting to note that making vis rous efforts to master its intri- Mr. Jefferies' ten brothers were fathers of cacies. Perhaps the largest family of our day is that founded by Mrs. Sadie Shivers, of Southern Georgia, whose children to the fourth generation number 310 actually living, while seventy-five are dead.

Mrs. Shivers, who is a hale old lady of over ninety, spends her last years in visiting her numerous family; and it takes two years to complete a single circuit of visits.

Mrs. James Kyrloff, a Russian woman who lived in the last century, was responsible for fifty-seven children, sixteen of whom were born four at a time, and twenty-one three at a time, while all the remaining twenty children were twins; and six years ago Mr. Browning, of Vancouver, was said to be the father of sixty seven children.

In 1892 Mme. Juneau, of Ecuador, gave birth to seven children at once, and a good lady of Pennsylvania in 1818 gave birth to ten children within twelve months. In New York there are more than eight hundred families, each of which contains nineteen children

Occupations of Women in England.

We are told that, whereas the census taker six years before the Queen came to the Household Ammonia, Sponges, throne contained no occupations for women except domestic service, there were at the date of the last census, 91,000 women dressmakers, 70,000 employed in public houses, 4,500 in printing establishments, and 4,721 in mines. The Post Office have nearly 30, 00 women as clerks, telegraphists, sorters, etc. Where there was one lady clerk in 1871 there are now four; and-two take to industries only-there are now 121 women per 100 men in the tobacco industry, as against 42 per Moth Paper, 1,000 in 1871; while in hemp and jute the women workers have increased from 67 per 100 men to 195 per 100. There are throughout the kingdom nearly 130,000 women engaged in teaching, almost three times the

Facts About Our Coal Outpout.

The annual report on our coal output contains some very interesting facts and figures. During one year the output was just over 202 million tons, an increase of 63 millions over the previous year. Of this huge quantity, we export 37 million tons. In the matter of coal, at any rate, we are free from the fear that the foreign producer will cut us out of our own home market, for our imports amounted to the quaintly ridiculous amounts of 138 tons from America, 714 tons from Belgium and 3,052 tons from Germany. Of the amount we exported France was our largest customer, and taking 51 million tons closely followed by Germany with just over 5 millions, and Italy with 43 million tons. The coal consumer will be mostly intrested in the figures relating to the price of coal. In London the average price was 15s. 4d. a ton. At the pit's mouth it was 5s. 11d.-Eng.


