HIS LORDSHIP BISHOP KINGDON visits the parishes of Andover, Grand Falls and Edmundston during the present month, and also the parishes of Fort Fairfield and Presque Isle in the Diocese of Maine. He will hold services and administer confirmation in each parish—in the two latter for Bishop Neely who is in poor health. Service and confirmation will be held by Bishop Kingdon at East Florenceville on Monday Oct 23rd at 7.30 p. m.

THE three youths, John Elliott hailing from St. John, and Merritt and Nason of Woodstock appeared before the magistrate on Friday morning, on the charge of being implicated in the Scovil and other robberies and were remanded again till Tuesday. The police are endeavoring to find the stolen watches. Among those who have suffered by sneak thieves lately is James T. Smith of Upper Woodstock who lost a set of harness. On Tuesday, the magistrate committed Merritt and Nason for trial. Elliott was remanded.

SENATOR GEORGE T. BAIRD has won a reputation for himself as a hunter. He was in the Tobique woods for some weeks with his sons. The latter got a moose or two but the Senator did not have good luck. On Friday, he started to portage across from Trousers Lake to the Tobique, and while on the way he ran across a fine caribou which he soon brought to the earth. On coming to the river he came on to a magnificent moose, and although somewhat tired and nervous from his long tramp he shot the big fellow and brought his two victims home in triumph. The moral is to have a loaded gun, until you get right into the heart of civilization, when on a hunting trip.

HOULTON ITEMS.—There has been no material change in the potato market, in so far as its effects Arrostook, this week. Potatoes have ranged all the way from ninety cents to a dollar. At present the Boston market is over supplied with potatoes. There is now a surplus of one hundred cars in Boston which over stocks the market and consequently keeps the price down. Dr. Nevers reports a spread of typhoid fever and scarlet rash in town. He says that the contagions are reaching alarming proportions instead of being on the wane. The races at Woodstock last week were well attended by Houlton sportsmen. They report having witnessed the best trot ever put on in this section of the country.—Times.

UP RIVER ITEMS.—Lumbering on the Tobique is being already prosecuted vigorously. James McNair has three or four camps of men on the right hand branch. Jud Hale has five camps on the Little Tobique; R. A. Estey has a big crew of men on the Gunquac; Geo. Upham is preparing for extensive operations on the Wapskyhagan, and J. E. McCollum has two camps on the Mamakezel stream. It has been a good season for the work of the lumberman, so far, capital weather for clearing stream, swamping roads, and generally getting ready for log cutting. The work on the Plaster Rock mill progresses favorably. The new building is to be 150 x 72. The dam which has been built is about 44 feet in length. With regard to the Grand Falls boom it is said everything is going along as "favourably as can be expected."

He started business on his own account at St. Marys 25 years ago, and had been very successful. He was 50 years of age and leaves a widow, formerly a Miss Smiler, and an adopted daughter. Mrs. T. McCarthy, Fredericton is a sister of the deceased, and his surviving brothers are C. L. Tilley, the well known cheese manufacturer of Woodstock, Chipman Tilley of Jacksonville, and Thomas Tilley of Victoria Corner, Carleton County. The deceased was a member of the Royal Arcanum, in which organization he had his life insured for \$3,000.

THE Saunders family of this town are establishing quite an enviable reputation as hunters. About a couple of weeks ago Guy Saunders shot a moose up Tobique. Last Thursday evening his brother, George of Saunders Bros., came in town with a magnificent specimen of the noble game. The animal was shot by Mr. Saunders in a wooded marsh about three miles back of Kilmarnock which is a settlement about twelve miles from Woodstock, in Northampton parish. Mr. Saunders went out the first of the week, and when he got his game was accompanied by an Indian, Stephen John Thomas, and James Belyea a well known settler of Kilmarnock. He got his moose on Wednesday morning, and brought him home in triumph yesterday. The moose measured in carcass 14 feet, from nose to tip of heel, with a horn measurement of 43 1/2 inches. The moose was admired by a number of sportsman who "viewed the remains" today.

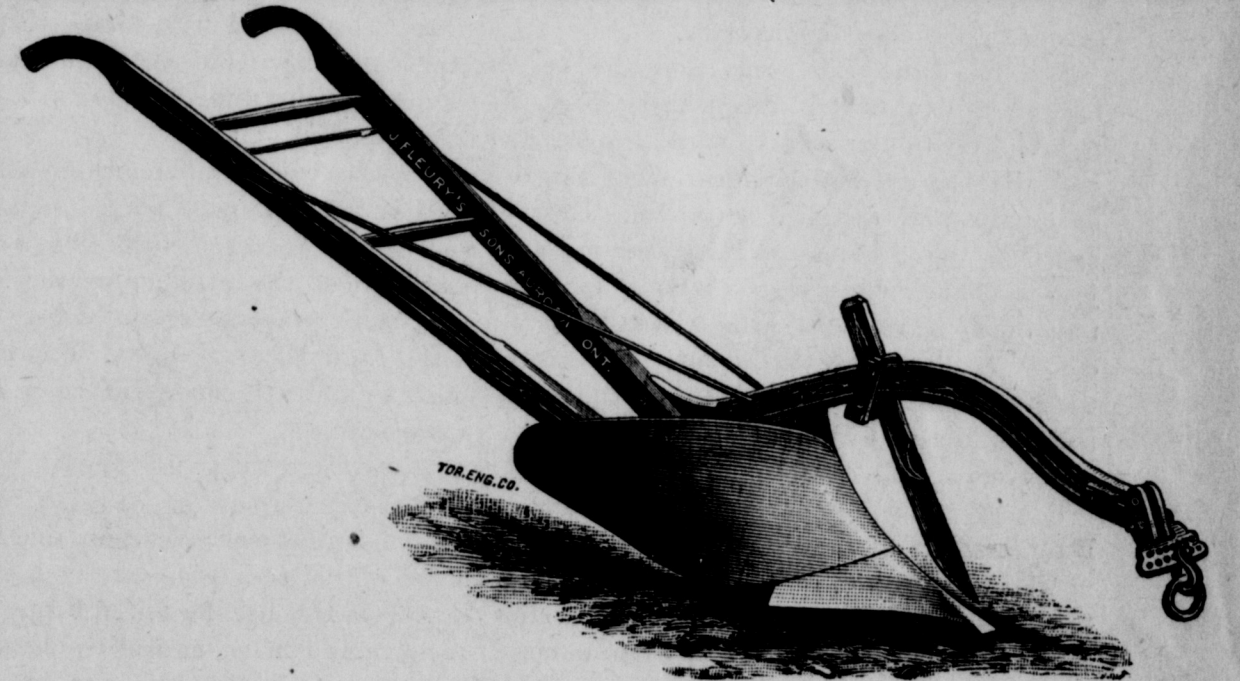
