The Baird Co. followed with a waggon loaded with cases of goods, one addressed to Oon. Paul, Transvaal, via London, and labeled Soothing Syrup; another Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, labeled Tonic.

In the evening there was a water parade. There were not many boats decorated, but what were fitted up, were fitted up well. John Shea's house at Grafton was very prettily decorated for the occasion and added much to the general appearance. The Judges Hugh Harrison, J. C. Hartley and Geo. The Promenade Concert in the Rink was attended by a large crowd, the music afforded by the Presque Isle Band.

Friday morning Farmers' and Largest Family parade was not a success. Only one farmer showed up. His display was excellent however and he had the satisfaction of taking the 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes. He is Sanly Baird of Grafton. For largest family—1st to Mrs. Dewitt, a bbl. flour; 2nd Wm. Hopkins, box of soap; 3rd, Indiana, box of soap. The two boxes of soap were presented by the St. Croix Soap Co. manufacturers of the celebrated Surprise Soap. Judges—F. B. Carvell, Wm. Dibblee, Dr. Sprague.

In the evening the Fire Works were a great attraction. They were set off by Mr. Dennison, American Consul, assisted by Mr. John Tattersall. It was the best fire work display ever seen in Woodstock.

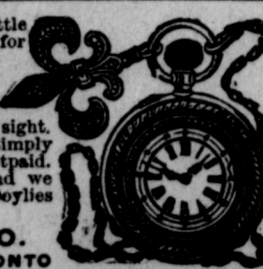

The election of County Councillors will be held on  
**Tuesday, the Thirty-First day  
of October next.**

Fifteen days public notice of the time and place of holding election to be given by Parish Clerks by posting in three of the most public places of the parish. Nomination of candidates to be filed with Parish Clerk or left at his residence at or before six o'clock p. m. on Monday the 23rd day of October. Parish Clerks to post names of candidates in three of the most public places in each polling district on or before Thursday, 26th October. Candidates' names also to be posted up at the polling place before the opening of the pole on day of election. The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as case may be) to act as chairman unless he refuses to serve, or is absent, or not competent by reason of relationship to candidate, when his name to be chosen by electors present. Assessors are required to furnish parish clerks with list of electors.

Note that time for holding election has been changed by Chapter 34 of Acts of 1898. Formerly under Acts of 1877 Chap. 44, it was Second Tuesday in October, but now it is the last Tuesday in October.
