Some Interesting Facts About the Supposed Unlucky Number-

Nothwithstanding all our boasted civilization and the efforts of the Thirteen Clubs, how few they are of us who are not in the inmost recesses of our hearts afraid of the simple number 13, says the Philadelphia Times. Deny it as we may, an unpleasant emotion arises in us if unwittingly we set down to dinner where thirteen people are to eat. This number, however, was not alway regarded as unlucky, in fact, there is plenty of evidence in the folklore of many ancient ori ental people to show that in olden times it ] was held as a lucky number. The history of

the Persians, the natives of India, and of the aboriginal Indians of our own Western continent, amply proves this fact. Bill cal students also well known that in Testamentary times the Jews were of the same opinion in regard to mystic number. Thirteen cities were especially dedicated to the priestly tribe: 13 high priests descended from Aaron: 13kings sat in the high council of the ancients preparations for the Feast of the Passover were begun on the 13th day of the month of Mizan, and the holy incense consisted of 13 different odors. Among the long-since extinct tribes of South America the number had a sacred and divine meaning, especially among the ancient Incas and Aztecs. The inhabitants of Perucounted seven days, without any particular name, in the week. The year had seven times 52 days or 4 times thirteen weeks. A father was compelled to support his child to the 13hh year. The Aztecs had weeks of 13 days, each with a special name. Their century had 52 years, or four times 13. Their public archives were of a circular form with a sun in the centre of each of the the 13 parts composing it, and their tribes numbered 13.

Queer Story About the Late Ruler of Holland.

When Mile. Emilie Ambre, the singer and dramatic teacher, died recently in Paris there 112 years old last March. She had been ill was an auction sale of her goods, most of which were bought by the Dutch Ambassador for the Government of Holland for the coasiderable sum of \$150,000. The affaire du coeur of the late King William III. of Holland for the singer is a matter of history.

The King became infatuated with Mlle Ambre when she was singing in opera at The Hague, and installed her in one of his palaces, much to the displeasure of the Queen, and finally of the people.

At last the King was obliged to send the singer away to Paris, where he established her in a villa, which he promised to furnish rich garments that the tyrant Dionysius proffrom the Dutch palaces.

The old King was a good judge of paintings fit only to make unhappy faces the more reand rare curios, and succeeded in packing a markable." valuable collection, which, however, he was unable to get out of Holland owing to the interference of the Dutch authorities. But the king in the end obtained his own way by gradually taking the valuables one by one in his own boxes and pockets until finally the entire collection reached the chamber.

The Dutch Government made no effort at the time to recover the pilfered articles, but notified the French police to see that the collection was preserved intact. The police were successful in preventing the ostensible owner from disposing of those rare works of art, and after her death an auction sale was held at which the entire lot was purchased for Holland and finally restored to the palaces of the Netherlands.
