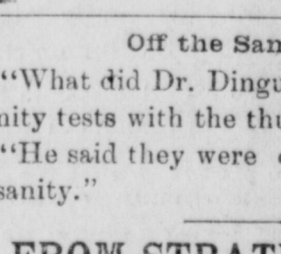

## Sunday School Work.

The Sunday school workers of Hartland have for some time past been designing some special work in the parish of Brighton, in addition to that done by themselves or by the general field secretary of the province. They have therefore engaged Miss Clementine Lucas, who has had considerable experience in Sunday school field work under her father, and has also spent three years in the Bible Normal college, Springfield, Mass. where child life, Bible study and teaching receive more special attention than in any other college known. She is not a stranger to this county, but has not previously gone to each place in detail as she will in this campaign. The officers of Brighton parish have sought the co-operation of other workers in the county, and the following list will show some other places where she is expected to go.

July 12th, Windsor, 7.30; 13th, Carlisle, 7.30; 14th, Hartland, 7.30; 16th, Cloverdale, 1.30, Main Stream, 6; 17th, Peel; 18th, East Florenceville; 19th, Lower Brighton 7.30; 20th, convention at Rockland beginning at 2; 21st, Windsor, 7.30; Havelock, 2.30. Wicklow and Simonds—Summerfield, 24th; Knoxford, 25th; Royaltown, 26th; Tracey's Mills, 27th; Florenceville, 28th. Sunday 30th back in Carlisle and Main Stream; 31st Hartland, 7.30. August 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th are to be spent in Woodstock parish. Detailed appointments of the two parishes will be given later.

The following will be some of Miss Lucas's subjects:—Principles of the Sunday school teachers' work, A teaching plan, The Sunday school teacher's work—responsibility, privileges, Sunday school work—how to make it both simple and attractive, A child in our midst, The Sunday school and its relations. It is not possible to apply these or other subjects to each place till the condition of each place is known by the speaker, but the first three mentioned subjects will probably be used in Hartland where the Sunday school work being more advanced, the workers will be asked to regard theirs as Institute sessions. The promoters hope that in the several places there will be earnest effort made to be in time for the beginning of the meeting, that each worker will make use of pencil, and of the opportunity to confer afterwards on the subject which has been taught. A Blackboard will be used where needed in the work, and Miss Lucas will do all to help those who are already in the work as superintendents or teachers, and to aid these in attracting the young people to be real helpers in Sunday school work.

The promoters will be under considerable expense in bringing Miss Lucas and in carrying out these plans, and it is hoped that this will be met by the special collections in the meetings for whose benefits these lessons are given. Some of the foremost workers in our Province will watch with interest this effort to do special work in Carleton county, and it may be that once more the example of this county in advanced Sunday school work will be followed by other counties. The prayers of christian people are asked in behalf of this series of meetings.

Wicklow and Simonds S. S. Convention held at Summerfield on Friday 30th ult, was very largely attended in the afternoon, and in the evening the church could not hold all who came. Convention opened with a devotional service led by Rev. D. Fiske, after which President E. L. West took the chair. After brief speeches by the president and Mr. Fiske, and the reading of minutes, the reports of schools were received, the majority of these were presented in writing which ensures brevity and definiteness. Among the most encouraging features were the large numbers of conversions reported in connection with some of the schools, especially Upper and Lower Knoxford, Royaltown and Tracey Mills. Then followed a very interesting conference in the work. At the evening session devotional exercises were led by Rev. Geo. Sellar. The lesson for July 2nd was very interesting and profitably dealt with by Mr. Perry, principal of Centreville school. The close attention held by Mr. Perry was a strong testimony to his efficiency. An earnest as well as stirring address was delivered by Mr. J. J. MacCaskill of Florenceville. A message appreciative of his brotherly co-operation in the past was drafted and ordered to be sent to Rev. J. E. Flewelling. An impressive address was given by Rev. Mr. Sellar. Normal work was dealt with by Mr. Fiske. Several are to take up the study. Collections \$2.73. Next convention to be held at Royaltown.

Was sired by the great Red Wilkes 1749—Record 2.40,

NELLIE CROW, dam of REED WILKES (4 yrs) 2.25½; Albany Boy 2.23.

REED WILKES was bred by T. L. Crow, Nicholasville, Ky. Is a dark bay horse with a few white hairs in forehead, and coronet white; 15½ hands high; weighs 1,150 lbs. In point of individuality, speed or breeding he ranks well among the produce of his famous sire, with an ideal conformation, best quality of legs and feet, coat that would grace a thoroughbred, disposition perfect, gait that could in no way be improved, and a horse of superb style, that transmits his qualities. He is certain to become a sire whose blood will be in demand at an early date.

His sire, Red Wilkes, sire of Ralph Wilkes, 2.06½, and grandsire of John R. Gentry 2.03½, the fastest stallion in the world, is by the records by far the greatest son of George Wilkes, as he has more 2.30 and more 2.20 performers than any other son, and he is also sire of more 2.30 and more 2.20 performers than any other living horse of his age.

NELLIE CROW, his dam, is a grandly bred mare, combining the three great brood mare strains—Mambrino Chief, Pilot Jr. and Clay, supported by the stout thoroughbred blood of Gray Eagle, Webster and Imp. Envoy. She produced four foals—REED WILKES (4 yrs) 2.25½, and Albany Boy 2.23; the other two were fillies and never trained, but kept for breeding. Nellie Crow trotted in 2.40 nearly twenty years ago, as a two-year-old, over a country half mile track, and her owner says if she could have been put in the hands of some of the trainers of today her record would have been 2.10 or better.

REED WILKES' record, which was obtained at four years of age, is far from a limit of his speed, as he has trotted a trial in 2.16½. Geo. H. Bailey, State Veterinarian, said that he saw him when he made his four-year-old record at Lexington, Ky., in a stake-race against the best four-year-olds in the country, and that the last heat he could have made below 2.20 had been driven for it.

REED WILKES for the season of 1899, will stand at Briggs' Stables, Briggs' Mills, Oakville, Carleton Co. On Saturdays he will be at Gilman's Stable, Woodstock.
