WELCOME THE TOURIST.

It is said that hundreds, probably thousands of visitors are coming from the Eastern and Middle States into the Maritime Provinces, to enjoy their vacations. At present Nova Scotia seems to be specially favored. Yet, a good share are making their way to this province and it behooves us to do all we can to encourage these desirable visitors. It is not so much that we value the tourist or the direct results of his visit, but the more people who visit a place for pleasure, the more likely some percentage will return with a business eye fixed on the land of their temporary sojourn.

The seaside has special attractions, with the mercury wandering among the nineties, and we cannot blame the tourist who wishes to keep close to the shores of the Bay of Fundy, in such a sweltering week as we have just passed through. But all summer days are not simmering, and the strong air of the seaside does not agree with all summer birds of passage.

We should see that the attractions of this county are brought before the travelling public. Speaking, seriously, this is a beautiful county, and the half is not known, to strangers, of its variety. If some organization would take up the question of advertising the Upper St. John, the results would probably be quite amazing. Views should be taken along the river, and pamphlets or papers containing them sent to such places as the tourist frequents when he is planning his summer trips. It would well pay the county or town council to appropriate a couple of hundred dollars for this very purpose. But many of our legislators cannot, or do not wish to see farther than their noses, and there would be a cry of holy horror, if such a suggestion were made.

The fact is that while other places are reaping direct and indirect results from tourist travel in the summer, Carleton gains nothing, and this is because of our lack of enterprise.

The newspapers are ready to do all they can but they need some backing.

AN OBJECT LESSON.

Recently a young man of this province was in search of a position. He was offered a first class place, where his business ability, his steady habits, and his excellent character, in general were known, provided he could speak French. But he couldn't.

There is quite an object lesson, here. How many of our young people can talk the language of two out of the five millions of our inhabitants, and what good is a young man in Montreal who cannot speak or at least read French.

It is not surprising that the older generation do not know the language. But, why should our young people not be urged the wisdom of learning such a beautiful and useful tongue? In England every one with the least pretention to education talks French. Much more should this be the case in Canada. With some people there is a foolish and ignorant idea that by learning French we will perpetuate the French language on this continent. The use of the French language will remain for some time to come, probably, for ever in Canada, and what objection is there to it?

In the meantime the French Canadian knows two languages and the English Canadian one. If this province becomes a manufacturing centre, the need of knowing French will become more apparent every day.

Mr. Balfour speaking in England recently strongly advised young people to learn one foreign modern language. That language for Canadians should be French.

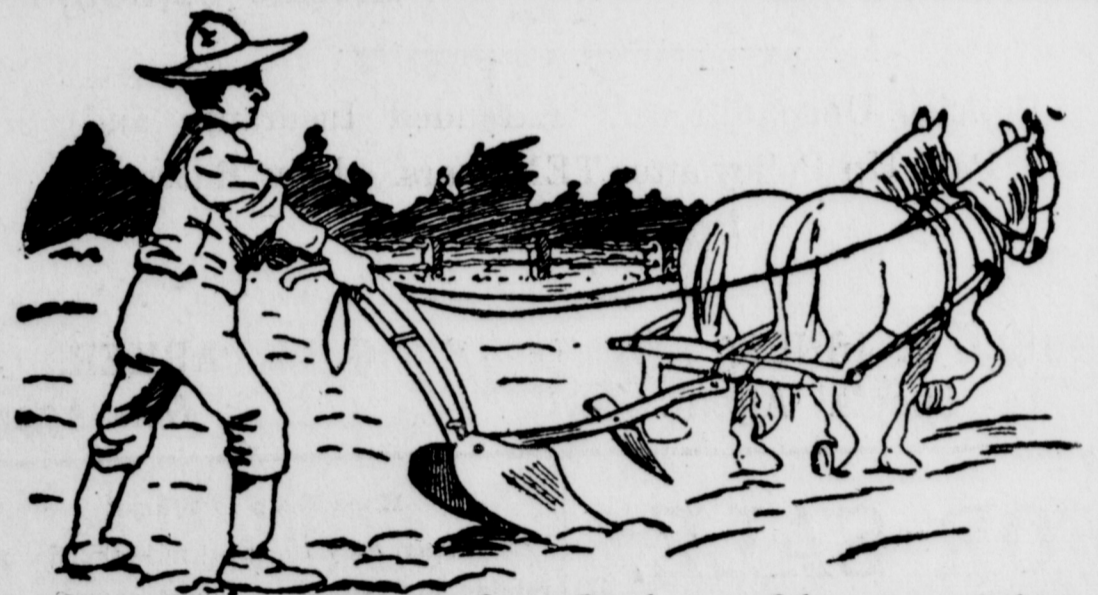
