EDITOR DISPATCH.—I notice the press of the county with one exception, together with several of the councillors would fain place the burden of the county defalcation, on my shoulders, taking refuge as they do behind the fact that I did not as the Press say "expose the rottenness," and as the Sentinel unburdens itself, that Mr. White "bringing suspicion of wrong and rottenness, should not at once share his suspicions with others." It appears to have been forgotten that in my place, I cautioned the council at the first opportunity not to re-appoint the Sec. Treas. until his accounts were investigated and audited, at the same time I wanted the council not to re-appoint Mr. Watts as auditor, as the Act of Assembly was against it. In the former not one councillor rendered me any assistance. In the latter I gave the reason for my objection, and yet the council was deaf to my remonstrances, and they re-appointed both, I being the only nay. Now Mr. Editor, after the desire I have manifested in the interest of economy and retrenchment at the council board from which in several instances I could not get a seconder to my motions it is most unfair to charge me with what was the duty of every councillor to see that the strictest investigation should be had in every department of the county service when money was received and expended; and I can assure these economists of the county council, before the election takes place in October next, the people to whom we will appeal for renewal of confidence, shall hear something as to where the many thousands of the taxpayers money has gone, during the seventeen years past, by and with the consent of the council, without any benefit to the county. This I had intended to do at the late session when the jail question came up, but the matter was suddenly laid over by adjourning the debate, and thus preventing further discussion.

Burglary at Houlton.

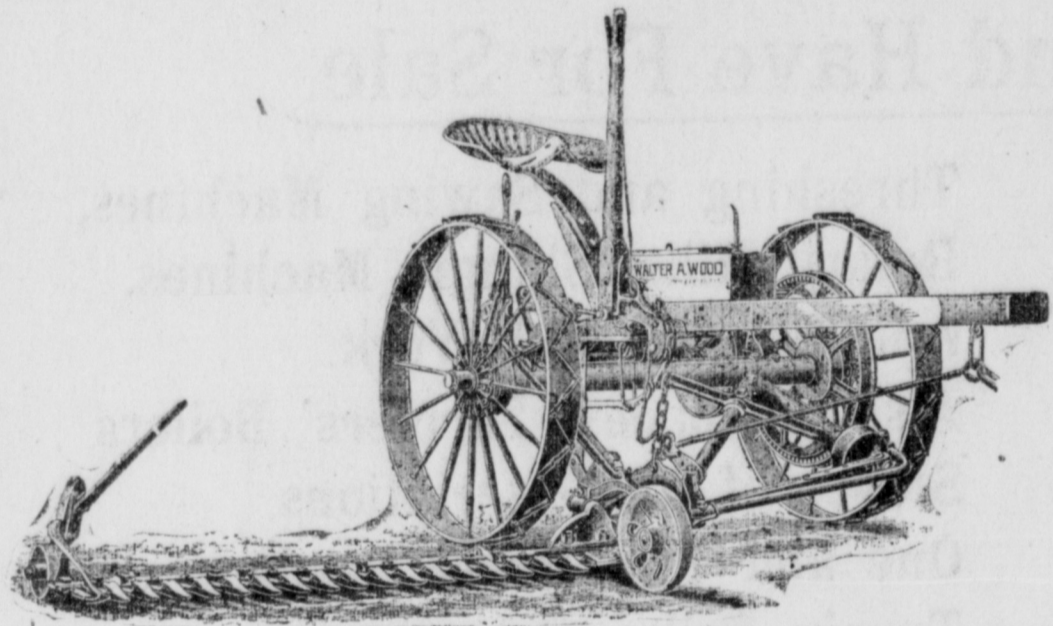
A bold and daring attempt at robbery was made in the store of Chas. P. Tenney & Son Monday night. Some one had planned on getting a boodle and laid his plans well, but for all that they failed to carry. As near as can be found two pistol shots were fired to break the glass in the window of the back door of the store. This being done it was easy enough to put the hand in and turn the bolt from the inside and entered the store. The outer door of the vault was successfully opened, but the robber or robbers could not get into the inner chamber. It is evident that the guilty party attempted to gain an entrance through the front door but was unsuccessful in this. A similar attempt at robbery was made upon the same store about one year ago. At that time the robber succeeded in getting possession of \$100. The circumstances surrounding the attempt of Monday night are so similar to those of a year ago that Mr. Tenney has no hesitancy in believing that the same party was concerned in them both. The man who made the attempt seemed to understand very well the plan of the store. Mr. Tenney has no clue to follow up in this matter. —Times.

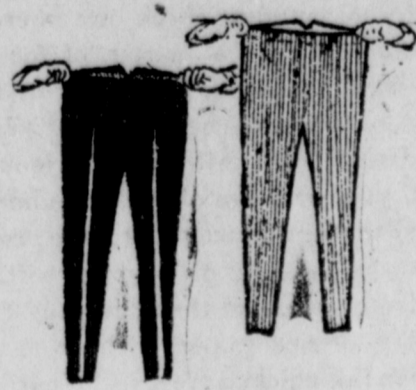

Knee Deep in Water.

MANILLA, July 10, 8 a. m.—It has been raining and storming almost constantly for two days, and the country along the American south and bay lines is literally flooded. The soldiers are suffering great discomfort. The Thirteenth infantry regiment at Pasay is in the worst position, being practically surrounded by water. The bridges that were used for getting supplies have been washed away, and some of the companies are now separated by streams six feet deep. In many cases the men are sleeping with three feet of water beneath their bunks, which are elevated on cracker boxes. The company cooks, when preparing the meals, stand knee deep in water.

Cause of Cancer.

LONDON, July 8.—The Central News says that Dr. Lambert Lack, a London surgeon, after long investigations, has established the theory that cancer is not attributable to a germ, but is always due to a specific injury in the basement membrane and allied structures. Dr. Lack produced cancer in animals by inflicting such injury.

A select committee of the Pathological Society which examined the results of Dr. Lack's investigations declares that they are practically conclusive.
