PROFIT earning of any life insurance company, is regulated largely by its mortality record,—the lower the death rate, the greater the profits for policy holders.—During the past ten years the death loss per 1000 of average lives in "Temperance and General," has been but 4.03,—while the average of all companies doing business in Canada during the same period, has been 10.32.

DR. WILLIAM SAUNDERS, director of the experimental farms, has received information which shows that the crops of 1899 in the province of New Brunswick have been encouraging and the yield of grain and hay is very satisfactory. Dairying is making considerable advancement throughout this province. Fruit growing is becoming more general, especially along many parts of the St. John river.

In the report of the supreme Court case of this term, appears this:—Argument on application to dissolve injunction in the case of the Attorney General v. the Tobique Manufacturing Co., was to have been heard before Judge Barker, sitting in equity here, but it went over by consent of counsel until the twelfth day after the opening of the legislature, to enable the company to make application for some legislation in the matter.

DURING the rain of two weeks ago the Stevens Lumber Co. attempted to bring down their lumber from the Big Machias where it has been hung up since last spring. There is 5,000,000 feet in the drive. About 100 men were hired at \$3 and 2.50 per day to move the lumber and after working several days the task was per force given up. The drive was brought down as far as Ashland, and is still nearly 60 miles from the mill. They won't attempt to move it again this season as the water would need to rise four feet to make it successful. As a consequence of this the mills will shut down in two weeks and won't start again until next spring. By this about 35 men will lose a winter's employment to say nothing of the loss to the Company. The town, too, will feel this misfortune to a greater or less extent.

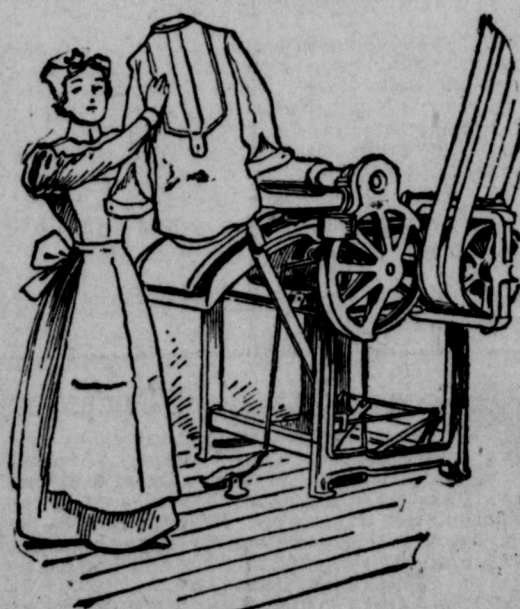

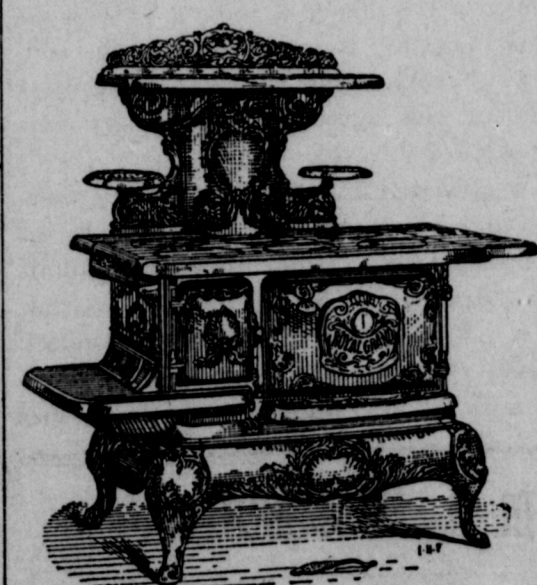
