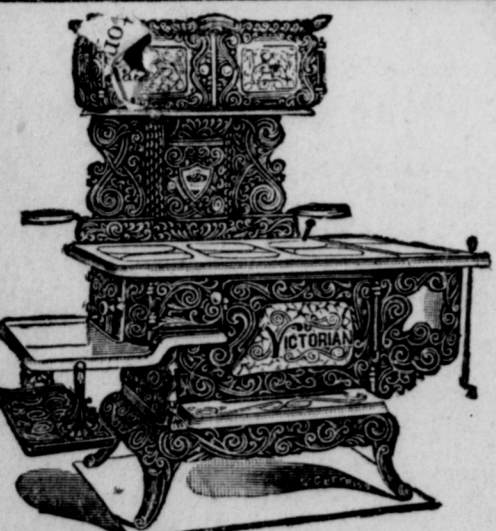

The Exhibition—the greatest in the history of Carleton County—will open today. Over \$3000 will be given in prizes. The formal opening will be at 2 o'clock this afternoon, when Lt. Governor McClellan, and members of his government will be present. The exhibition will be declared open by His Honour.

GONE TO HIS ACCOUNT.

Didn't Survive His Murdered Father Long.

Word has reached THE DISPATCH of the death in Houlton gaol of young Daniel Murphy, found guilty of murdering his father Daniel Murphy, sen. The circumstances of the murder are well known. The victim was born in Woodstock, and he and his son lived here at different times. The crime was a cold blooded affair and occurred at Mars Hill, Me, about a year ago. In his defence young Murphy claimed that he was provoked, and that he lost complete control of himself.
