FAIRNESS IN POLITICS.

In prize fighting there are certain rules that must be adhered to, and it is probable if the intensity of our political battles increased we will have to borrow a code of honour from the ring men. The British people pride themselves on their system of fair play, but, in politics, in this part of the Empire at all events, we do not act up to the tradition.

This county has been the scene of some very discreditable election contests. Personal matters have been introduced into the warfare, and the ambition of each candidate seems to be to utterly discredit the other. Each tries to prove the other a liar, and a scoundrel, generally, and so the merry game goes along. The exhibition is altogether pitiable.

Why because two men differ as to the better policy for advancing the interests of the country, should it be necessary to bestow angry glances at each other, and to vilify each other. Because they both seek the confidence of the electorate, on the ground that the policy that is advocated by the one is opposed to that of the other, is the right this should breed bad feeling. The reason is not far to seek. Success is what the political aspirant is after. To be beaten he regards as an eternal disgrace. To win, even by using the most dastardly means, is all right. An exchange ironically remarks "Votes have gone up in Ontario to \$25 a head and we pity the moral turpitude of the French people." This is a grim joke but very much to the point.

It is a pleasure, all the more so because a rare pleasure, to come across a fair political journal. In large cities where intelligence seems to be the more general, mean fighting does not seem to prevail, among journals, at all events, as in smaller communities. Fancy, the Toronto Globe a government organ, saying that at Mr. Foster's recent meeting in Toronto, there was a "magnificent audience." Why, haven't we been always taught that the other fellow can not possibly have a good audience. It is a baker's dozen when he speaks, but a "large and enthusiastic audience" when our man is on the platform. The Globe doesn't say Mr. Foster is "small beans" and a weak character generally. In fact, in its editorial on the subject, it says nothing mean. But the article is quite as effectual, at least among its decent readers.

We have known two meetings held in Woodstock. At one a leading Liberal, at another a leading Conservative was the main attraction. And, how earnestly did the respective parties discuss the question as to which had the bigger meeting. As a matter of fact they were both good meetings. Partisanship is a necessary evil. It is not good in itself. In fact it is displeasing to a respectable man. But he knows party government is the best means we have to govern ourselves. Therefore, he is loyal to the party, but he does not think true party loyalty, implies "envy, hatred, malice and all uncharitableness" towards those who do not agree with him.

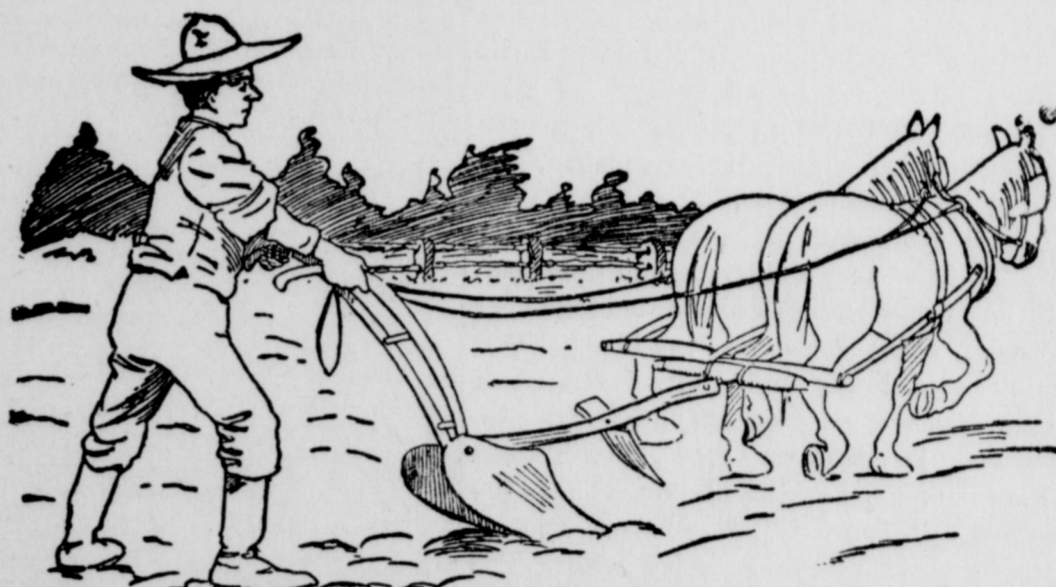
