BUYING HIS DISCHARGE.

Means by Which Tommy Atkins Cuts Short
His Service.

When Tommy Atkins buys his discharge there is generally something in the wind. It may be that he has grown sick of the service or come into a little money, or that a better chance has opened for him; but not infrequently there is something vastly more interesting behind, and the War Office officials, who have the work of receiving and granting soldiers applications for discharge, have an insight into many a strange story, although they do not perceive everything.

Many a soldier is bought out of the army to become someone's trusted servant, but to few does such good fortune occur as that which came the way of a corporal of a regiment of Lancers. During a brief holiday in the Isle of Wight, this gallant Tommy was so happy as to have an opportunity of rescuing an invalid lady in a bath chair from a position of considerable peril, out of gratitude for which she offered to buy her rescuer out of the army and create for him a position upon a small estate she possessed.

After declining the offer more than once, the corporal finally consented, received his discharge, and took up his duties as estate-manager to his benefactress. Three years later the lady died, leaving a good half of her real and all her personal property to the corporal, who, it must be admitted, was more than adequately paid for his act of gallantry. Not a few officers become so attached to their regimental servants, that, rather than part with them when the time comes to retire from active service, they buy their men out of the army and make them their private servants. This was done by a certain colonel in the Guards, a bachelor, but so far from the man becoming a private servant he was treated more like an adopted son. The colonel had him well educated, and only before friends treated him at all masterly.

Eventually he bought him a share in a good stationary and printing business, later even helping him to buy out his partners, whose shares increased his income to over a thousand a year. For some considerable time the colonel devoted much of his energies in assisting in the management of the concern, which, at his death had been worked into a very lucrative business, floating into a company at a purchase price of £34,000 in cash and shares. Yet people say life in the army kills any business capacity a man may have.

Being bought out by his sweetheart is another way Tommy gets out of the army; dozen of such cases occur annually, though everyone does not know where the money comes from. A certain smart sergeant of a regiment of the line was once bought out and actually married by a niece of the colonel of his own regiment, an unfortunate affair, which, on becoming known, brought about the colonel's resignation, albeit the sergeant was an eminently respectable fellow, well educated, and a splendid soldier. But, coming so near home, it was a painfully awkward matter for his colonel, who, however, never opposed the marriage, which has, we believe, proved a very happy one.
