Tuesday he was informed of a married woman who had run away with a man from one of the up country towns. They did not come in this direction, however. Wednesday morning Mr. Lawlis was called out to receive a description over the telephone, of a couple who had eloped from Bristol N. B. Mr. Lawlis captured the couple at the B. & A. depot as they were about to board the car for Bangor. The woman had left a husband and family of children at home to run away with another man. She had stolen a cloak before starting out and it was on the charge of larceny that she was detained in this town. We regret to learn that the Rev. R. L. Sloggett has lately been advised of the death of his only brother Capt. Harry Sloggett of the Royal Engineers at present stationed at Chatham England. Capt. Sloggett though a man of fine physical strength and soldierly qualities succumbed to the malarial troubles prevalent on the West Coast of Africa where he had been on active service and failed in health very rapidly after his return to England, though never giving up his military duties. Capt. Sloggett leaves a mother, wife and one daughter and was only 35 years of age. The funeral of Mrs. Adam Dickinson, mother of Dr. Dickinson of this town, took place Thursday. Services were conducted at the home and at the church at Kirkland, N. B., by the pastor Rev. Mr. Fowler assisted by the Rev. Kenneth McKay of Houlton. Ten of her eleven children were present. A very large concourse of relatives and friends assembled to pay the last tribute of respect to a friend dearly beloved by all who knew her. THE deed of the site of pier for the bridge on the west side of the river, 66x100 has been purchased from Joseph McGee. The price paid is \$25. The site of the approach on the side obtained from Henry Foster is 8 feet wide on the main highway road and 44 feet on the river and lies directly below the ferry road. The price allowed Mr. Foster is \$200. Charles Grey of Waterville, acted as arbitrator for the Hartland Bridge Co., and J. T. G. Carr acted on behalf of Henry Foster. Murdoch Matheson was referee. Messrs Gray and Carr could not agree and the final decision was given by Mr. Matheson. The road to the bridge was laid out by the commissioners a couple of weeks ago for Wakefield, so the necessary sites are obtained and the contract can be awarded immediately on receipt of a satisfactory tender. 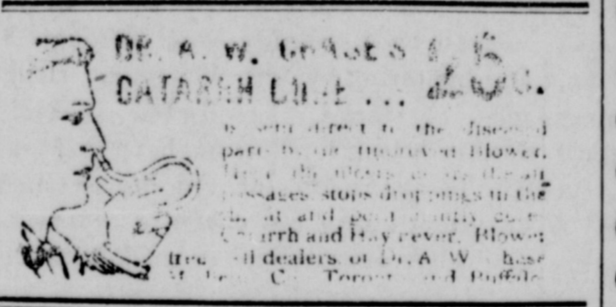

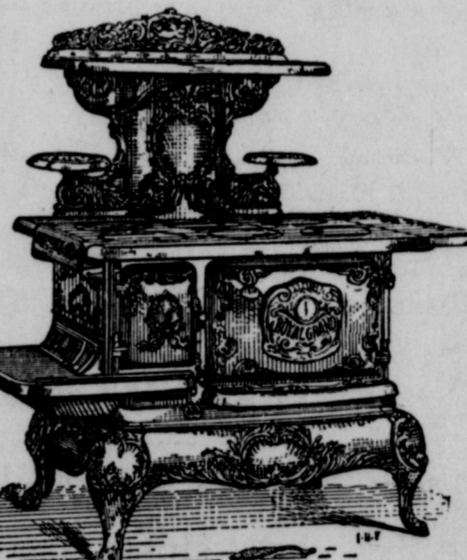
