EMERY MANUEL of Knowlesville, one of the most prosperous farmers of that section of country, met with a very serious accident on the 21st inst. He was feeding grain into an old fashioned threshing machine which had a wooden concave, his hand got caught in the beater, tearing off the whole inside, leaving nothing but the cords and skin on the back of the hand. This necessitated amputation and Dr. Curtis was called from Hartland as quickly as possible and he, assisted by Dr. Welch of Glassville, performed the operation, removing the hand about three inches above the wrist. Another accident occurred the same day in Hartland which might have proved fatal. Henry Foster, who is employed in Sawyer's mill to bunch lathes, was the victim. While at work a bolt flew from the lathe machine striking Mr. Foster on the head with so much force as to throw him against the saw. Fortunately he escaped with only the loss of one finger, the index finger on the right hand, whereas he might have lost his whole hand, or in fact his life. It was a very narrow escape. Dr. Estey did the necessary surgical work. Ellsworth Lewis who is employed on J. T. G. Carr's new house, had a bad fall the same day. He was standing on a staging which gave away beneath him and he fell to the ground, a distance of about 15 feet. No bones were broken but he received a severe shaking up, causing him to lay by from work several days.—Advertiser.

THE annual meeting of the Carleton County Agricultural Society was held in Woodstock on the 21st inst. There were present C. L. Smith, chairman, C. R. Carman, secretary, Messrs. C. P. Bull, C. W. Connell, J. R. Murphy, Jas. Watts, J. A. Shea, J. S. Leighton, S. Watts, E. A. Bull, C. L. Perkins, J. J. Rogers, Andrew Stevenson, H. E. Gallagher, H. B. Smith, Robert Brown, Rankine Brown, James Watts, secretary to the Exhibition Managing committee, made a report showing receipts as follows: Receipts \$2,188.00; Expenditures \$2,193.04; leaving balance cash on hand \$5.04. There was still remaining unpaid some \$31.25 on premiums, and \$33.25 on accounts. There was about sufficient money remaining of the government grant to pay off the indebtedness of the exhibition. The secretary presented his financial report for 1899, showing a balance on hand of \$184.53, with some outstanding bills still to be paid. Before proceeding to the election of officers Secretary Carman said he had long been of the opinion that the secretary should be a gentleman residing in town. A SAD ACCIDENT—A most distressing accident happened at Lockhart's Mills last Wednesday morning, whereby Charles Lockhart, son of L. S. R. Lockhart lost his life. This was necessary to do in order to enlarge the entrance of the flume into a reservoir, which had been built to give more force of water. The gate of the flume swung to unexpectedly, and pushed the young man in a corner behind it. His father dropped a ladder and went down to his relief, but the water came in in great force, and finally swept over the head of the unfortunate youth. His father did his best to extricate him, and only desisted when the water rose sufficiently to cover him. It was some time before the body was extricated. Every attempt at resuscitation was made but in vain. The young man was well known. He was in his 18th year. The utmost sympathy is felt for the father and family. The funeral was on Saturday last. A service was held in the house by Rev. Mr. Crisp. The remains followed by 80 carriages were taken to Jacksonville and the body was placed in the Baptist church where services were conducted by Revs. Messrs. Atkinson, Crisp, Blakeney and Colpitts. Interment took place in the Everett burying ground, Rev. Mr. Coy officiating at the grave.

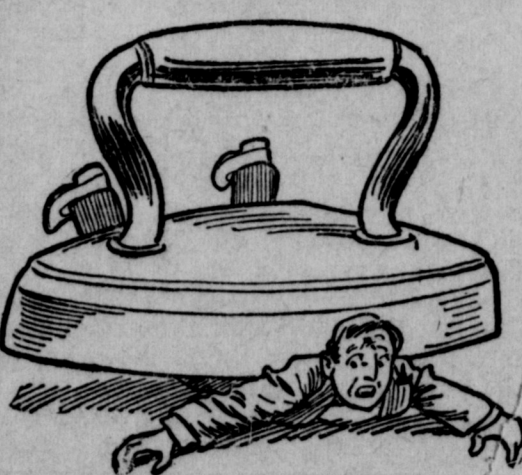

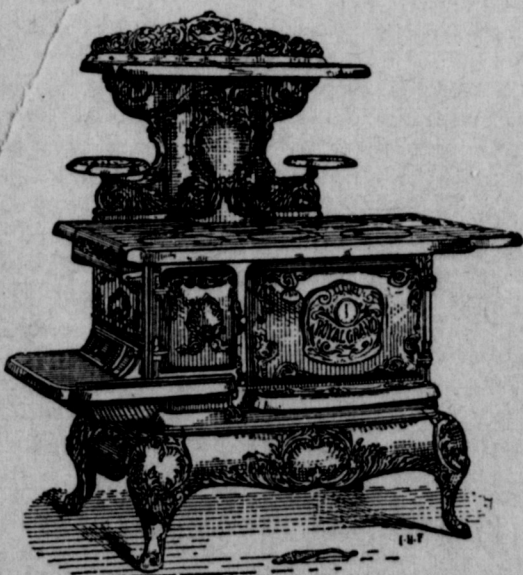
