ST. JOHN and the Maritime Provinces generally are well advertised in an article in a number late of the Canadian Grocer on the recent meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade, by Mr. Edmunds editor of that journal, who came from Toronto to report the proceedings. He has several pretty views of scenery on the St. John river, illustrating his article.

G. U-HAY returned to the city on Saturday from his trip up the St. John River with Prof. Macoun, government botanist. They visited Woodstock, mouth of Aroostook and Grand Falls, examining the plants along the route. Prof. Macoun is delighted with the evidence of the great natural wealth of the St. John River Valley, and pronounces it one of the finest River Valleys he has ever seen. Its possibilities for the future, he declares, are enormous in the way of fruit culture, sheep and cattle raising and dairy produce, if the people will turn their attention more to these branches of industry, for which the valley is wonderfully adapted. Prof. Macoun's report will be looked for with great interest. He will remain some days at Woodstock, after which he will visit the lower part of the Tobique valley, the upper St. John as far as Edmundston, and the River St. Francis, returning to Ottawa by the way of River de Loupe.—Sun.

A PLEASANT OUTING.—Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Jones have returned from their annual driving trip which this year was through a fertile portion of Aroostook Co., Maine, and through Carleton and Victoria counties. They first drove to Centreville, thence through Blaine and Presque Isle to Caribou and around to Fort Fairfield. From the Fort they drove over to Andover, and then down the river St. John, home. The journey covered, in all, 165 miles. In Aroostook county they found that about one in ten of the farmers originally came from this province. As usual there are immense potato crops, though the tendency now is to go in for general farming, wheat is quite extensively raised this year. Potatoes are selling for 90 cents a barrel in the field. Taking everything into consideration Mr. Jones says that Carleton Co. leads Aroostook. The grain and corn crops are looking fine all along the St. John river from Aroostook down, and the country generally is charming.

Mrs. Jones' father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. George L. Raymond, the latter being Mrs. Blake's sister, are living at Victoria, B. C. and the visitors will spend a very pleasant winter with those and other near relatives there and in Washington State.

A HAPPY WEDDING.—At St. Paul's Presbyterian church this morning at 5 o'clock Miss Maud Henderson, youngest daughter of Alex. Henderson will be united in marriage to Samuel S. Miller of Hartland, the ceremony to be performed by Rev. G. D. Ireland. The bride will be given away by her father. The young couple will leave on the early train for Montreal and Toronto. Miss Henderson has been an active member of the Presbyterian church, from whose ranks she will be very much missed. She was the recipient of a large number of handsome presents from appreciative friends.

HON. Mr. Pugsley of St. John, N. B. was in the city, and it is stated that the well known lawyer is here with a view to meet a number of Canadian and American capitalists who are interested in the New Brunswick railway enterprises. The statement has been made that the St. John Valley and River de Loupe railway, running from Fredericton to Woodstock, a distance of sixty miles with a probable extension to Houlton, Me., may be built in the near future. The prospects are also bright it is said, for the early construction of what is known as the Central railway of New Brunswick, from the Grand Lake coal fields near Newcastle, in Queens County, N. B., to Fredericton thus giving a western outlet for the coal products of the province. The length of this road will be about forty miles.—Montreal Gazette.

The Hartland Bridge.

The Hartland Advertiser says:—Chief Engineer Wetmore and Civil Engineer Harrison of Fredericton arrived in this village on Wednesday and the next day made the survey for the new bridges. The proposed site has been known for some time but the engineers have actually run out the line and have driven the stakes on the ground. This will enable the company to purchase the land for the east and west embankment approaches. The survey taken was in accordance with the contour survey, longitudinal measurements and heights taken in the summer of 1896. Soundings were also taken to ascertain if there had been any material changes in river-bed since that date. The side is immediately below the ferry landing on either side of the river. Negotiations are now going on for the purchase of the sites which are owned, the one by Henry Eoster, the other by Joseph McGee. Last week a Dominion government engineer examined the location, but at time of writing the Ottawa authorities had not given the Company live to construct the bridge. This is however, only a matter of form, except that this bridge must be as high above the water as these at Woodstock and Florenceville. This will raise the bridge 6 feet higher than the specifications call for.

A Good Job.

We have expressed hearty accord with Coun. Graham and the road committee in their admirable work in road making on King St. and Main St. Hill. The council at its last session agreed to the work being continued up as far as the English church, on Main street, it being announced that having gone over delinquent tax lists for many years past, there would be more than enough from that source to pay for the extras over the regular street appropriation. About \$350 will complete the work and put Main street hill in better condition than any of us had hoped to see it, unless paved. Coun. Graham has his faults, like the rest of us, but his head is level on the street improvement question.
