UPPER CANADIAN VISITORS.

At the recent meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade, there was a good deal of comment on the comparatively small number of Upper Canadians who visited the Maritime Provinces, and it was hinted that they knew little and cared less for their fellow Canadians by the sea. There is no difficulty in accounting for the comparative unacquaintance of inland Canadians with maritime people. It is only a few years since easy communication was established between east and west. Then there is the undoubted fact that Quebec, to use a timely expression, is more or less of a "non-conductor" between the Maritime Provinces and the English speaking west. Our people when they took a notion to travel went to Boston or New York. It is only very recently that they have been taking trips to Montreal and Toronto. The Ontario people had been in the habit of visiting, in the summer the towns in New England, because they were convenient of access. But this is all changing now. Ontario people look forward to trips to the Maritime provinces in the summer, and the Toronto exhibition is becoming a popular outing for business men and farmers in these provinces.

Confederation was carried in a rush, but it took time to acquaint the people of each province with the others. When they become to know each other, they find they are very much alike. The Canadian national spirit is growing healthfully.

Schools are everywhere in Ireland to-day, and the children are receiving a better education than ever before. But Ireland is an agricultural country. Its manufactures are of minor importance. In all such countries the means of making a living is limited. As a result, for years to come there will be a large immigration of the surplus population." At the request of the Maritime Stock Breeders Association all the mangers and stalls in the St. John Exhibition Stockyards have been thoroughly cleaned and also disinfected with a germicide wash.

The cattle sheds have had a central partition made from floor to roof which will prevent all cross drafts. Where necessary, rods will be provided on which to stretch curtains to completely enclose the animals.

Exhibitors who are taking stock and other products from the St. John Exhibition to Halifax can have them carried at half fare on the Intercolonial Railway and with a free return to starting point.

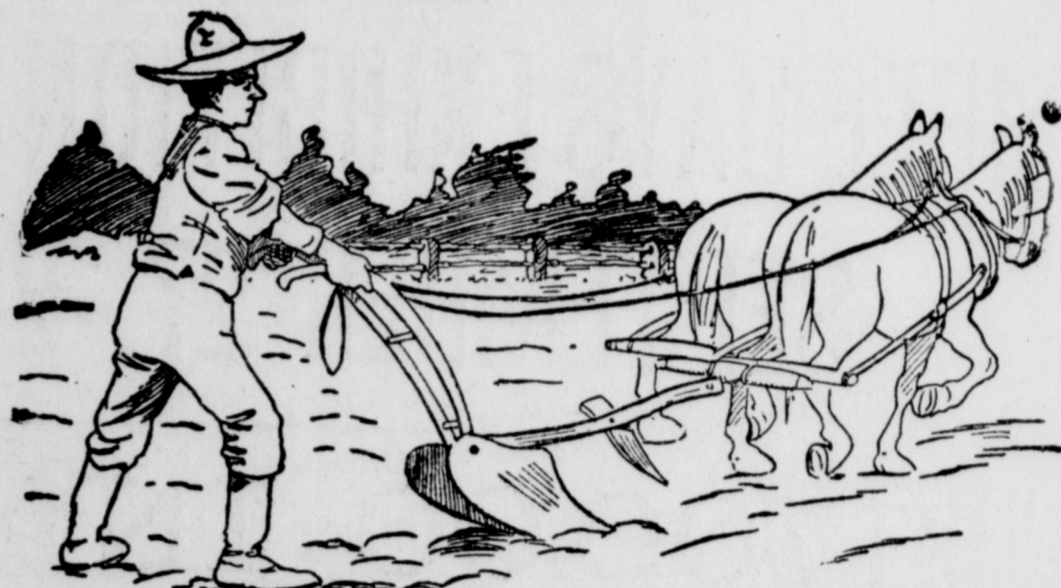
